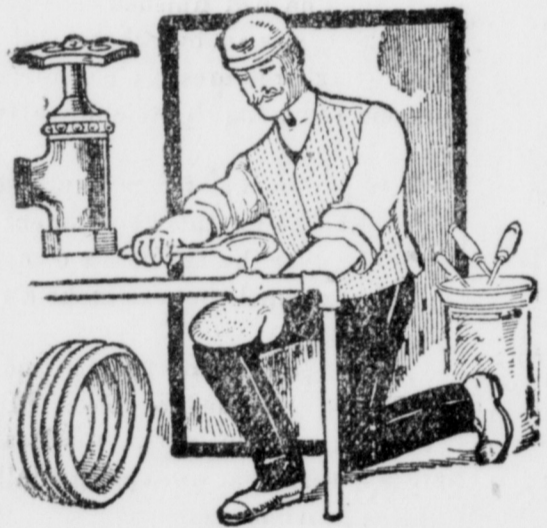

Rising Without Climbing.

This is the day of spectacular ascents from poverty to affluence; and our young men are being impressed with the so-called success of those who "rise without climbing."

Unfortunately the tales of the successful manipulations of such men as Rockefeller and Harriman are seen only from one side, and work a bad influence. The other side, where disaster follows after unfair or evil methods of attaining worldly success, especially in financial matters, is either missed or ignored.

A writer in The Home Herald "sizes up" the meaning of this kind of success in the following incisive terms:

"Every little while some lucky man seems to solve the question, 'How can I rise without climbing?' The papers are full of the man who was on the right side of the market, or who made a lucky strike, or who won on a tip. To the ordinary man who toils hard for small gain, it appears that these fortunate individuals float upward without effort."

"To the young man the contrast is especially strong. He sees how much effort his father must make to maintain himself, and he pictures a life of toil as hopeless as slavery. He plans how a little more taking of chances, a little less honesty, and a little more cunning would smooth the way. And often the resolve is made that he will never wear away his life in poorly-paid drudgery."

"To a boy of this type, recent exposures must mean much. He cannot know that nine out of ten who try to rise without climbing never rise at all. He will not heed the warning of those older than himself. But when a man who has risen high falls, he cannot help but notice how terrible is the crash and how small a bolt can destroy a great reputation. Thirty years from now some of our sturdy citizens will be thanking God for the object lessons furnished at the critical period of life. Perhaps our defaulting bankers' our bribe-taking statesmen, and our stock juggling capitalists may atone in falling for the harm they do in rising."

The Medical Journal records that when a boy of 2½ years underwent an operation for appendicitis the other day in Newcastle several hairs from a toothbrush were found in the diseased appendix. At St. Bartholomew's Hospital the physician interviewed stated that bristles and hairs from tooth-brushes are often found in the appendix of patients oper-

ated on for appendicitis. "But," he added, there are other foreign substances which are more common, such as small orange pits or grape seeds. We not infrequently find tiny fragments of porcelain like enamel. These are undoubtedly tiny clippings from the enamel pots and pans which are used for cooking purposes in so many homes. The habit of moistening a lead pencil with the tongue before writing is another dangerous practice, which may produce trouble, because fragments of the hard lead may be broken off unwittingly and swallowed."

Miss Charlotte Mansfield, an adventurous young author, sailed from London to Cape Town recently with the intention of starting on a lonely tramp of 8,000 miles toward Cairo.
