people have the right to criticize officials. If I go out these cases will have to be handed over to a new man. If it were not for this we would have not the deficit to report.

Coun. Melville said he had no feeling against Mr. Colpitts but he must move that Mr. Colpitts be removed.

Coun. Hay, seconded the motion.

Warden—Spoke of the extreme views expressed. It is an easy matter to find fault, but if you were to ask the Inspector how much help he got from the people he would say mighty little. He did not say he had sympathy only for Mr. Colpitts. Sympathy was all very good, but he had confidence in Mr. Colpitts as an officer. He believed Mr. Colpitts would resign when he felt he was unfit for the office. Almost always this question came up as to retaining Mr. Colpitts and until I see someone better I will not go for his dismissal. Take Carleton County and compare it with other counties and I venture if you will get statistics and the opinions of temperance workers and I believe we will find this county stands in the very forefront in temperance enforcement. The question of deficit does not count. I have perfect confidence in the Inspector and I do not wish to see him dismissed.

Coun Melville—Is the official to decide when he is to resign? This should be a matter for the council, not for the official to decide. This was a strange sentiment to come from the head of the council. I am not going to condemn the Scott Act, but I believe in a younger man. We are not complaining of the deficit, but we get less results.

Coun J R Brown—I do not consider I am particularly interested in this. I voted with the majority in the last vote, but I will not vote for his dismissal. I think he should resign.

Coun Estey—I will not vote for his dismissal. He is too good a man to be dismissed.

Coun Conolly had favoured an assistant to Mr Colpitts. I would not vote for his dismissal.

The warden thought that Coun Melville reflected on him in his last remarks. Particularly as there was nothing in the resolution that passed. Mr Colpitts was not compelled to resign but the council can dismiss him by a two thirds vote. I would like for Coun Melville to state what he meant when he made that remark he did.

Coun Melville—I wasn't trying to discredit you and if I said anything that reflected I will withdraw. If we start a precedent of officials remaining office until they feel fit to resign it will be a bad precedent.

Coun Melville's motion was lost by the following vote:—

Coming of the Comet.

(Boston Transcript)

Extensive preparations are being made by Harvard astronomers for the studying and photographing of the Halley comet, which, after an absence of 73 years, will be visible through a powerful telescope some time this winter.

The government has offered a prize to the scientist who determines its exact position in the sky. At Cambridge plans are being made to photograph the sky every night. Pictures will also be taken at the Harvard observatory in South America, where apparatus is being used to photograph the Morehouse comet.

The comet has been named after Halley because he predicted that it would appear in the year 1758, and, although he had been dead 15 years, the comet did appear as he foretold. The history of the world indicates that this comet appeared at following dates: B. C. 97 and 12, and A. D. 66, 141, 218, 295, 373, 451, 530, 608, 684, 760, 837, 912, 989, 1066, 1145, 1222, 1301, 1378, 1456, 1531, 1682, 1758.

Astronomers say that the comet is moving toward the earth at the rate of 500 miles a minute, over an elongated orbit, 2,800,000,000 miles from the sun. The comet may only appear faintly, but if so it will do contrary to its past history. By the middle of the summer it is predicted that it will be possible to see it with a small telescope. About May 15, 1910, it will be within 23,000,000 miles of the earth, when it ought to be visible to the naked eye. The tail of the comet will extend 1,000,000 miles across the sky.

The search of the planet, which is believed to be beyond Neptune is being actively pursued at the Harvard astronomical observatory by Prof. William H. Pickering and his assistants. The search is being made through a careful study of a number of excellent photographs of the region where the planet is supposed to be taken by Rev. Joel H. Metcalf, a Taunton clergyman, who is interested in astronomical study.
