It is rumored there is shortly a change to be made in the Intercolonial Engineering Department. Moncton, through the transfer to Ottawa of Chief Engineer W. B. MacKenzie, Assistant Engineer A. McLellan and Fred. King, the department then to be amalgamated with that of T. C. Burpee, Engineer of Maintenance and Way, who will be at its head.

THE congregation of the United Baptist Church have extended an invitation to Rev. Mr. Kennedy of Sussex to assume the pastorate, which has been vacant since the resignation of Rev. Professor W. C. Kierstead, Ph. D., now of the university. The call is a hearty and most unanimous one, and it is hoped that the reverend gentleman may accept. The stipend has been fixed at \$1,200, with moving allowance.

IN the Supreme Court at Fredericton, last week, the case of Fisher against the town of Woodstock was taken up. This was an application to set aside a verdict which had been entered in favor of defendant at a trial on an action which was in respect of a contract for the sale and purchase of a quantity of facing stone. Judgement was given setting aside the verdict originally obtained and a verdict entered for plaintiff for \$168.

A number of St. John firms are among the creditors of A. B. Lyons, who carried on a business here under the name of the Lyons Syndicate and Dry Goods Company. At a meeting of the creditors held on Thursday a statement was submitted showing liabilities amounting to about \$5,000 with assets consisting of stock in the store. J. C. Hartley, of Woodstock, and H. H. Pickett, of St. John, were appointed inspectors and instructed to dispose of the estate with as little delay as possible. The meeting adjourned until April 20 when the estate will be wound up.

ON Thursday while a Polish labourer was at work at Murdoch's camp, No. 1, near Foreston; a big chunk of frozen earth rolled down the embankment, and striking him, killed him almost instantly. Coroner Scott of Glassville viewed the remains and considered an inquest unnecessary. The poor man's fellow-countrymen desired that his remains be buried along side the right-of-way, obviously so that at any future time they might be disinterred and removed. A coffin was sent out from Bristol and on Friday the request was carried out. In the early hours of Saturday morning, at Murdoch Bros. No. 3 camp, a short distance further south; another foreign workman was fatally injured about the head by a premature explosion of dynamite. He died soon after.
