The concrete piers of the Clover Bar Bridge, on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, are said to be the longest of all concrete piers in Canada, and perhaps in the world, says the Edmonton Bulletin. There are four of them, two of which are 149 ft. high, and the others seven feet less in height. The bridge, from abutment to abutment, is 1,600 feet in length. The piers extend 40 feet below the surface of the water.

The concrete work was undertaken in midwinter. This was one of the difficulties with which the constructing company had to contend. To work with concrete during cold weather it is necessary to use heat.

Houses were constructed around the piers, and these were heated with steam, which was conveyed from a plant on the river bank. After placing and stacking the concrete in its moulds it was also necessary that it should be kept heated for at least a day, and then allowed to set gradually.
