Hartland Poultry Show.

The Poultry Show of the Carleton and Victoria Association was away ahead of that of last year. The attendance and number of exhibits were both fifty per cent greater. The interest manifested was also greater. In addition to what has already been reported of this show we may say that the Hartland Poultry Yards won more prizes than any others; even as they did at St. John and Halifax and in this county last autumn. Dr. Hagerman took all the prizes on young Wyandottes; and Robert Kidney of Belleville carried away a large number of prizes. George E. Baxter of Andover and A. Roy Rigby of Hartland took first prizes on utility stock. William Boyer of East Florenceville showed a recent importation of African Geese that attracted a great deal of attention. A. A. Belyea and J. N. Belyea of Coldstream; Howard, respectively, excellent brown and white leghorns, while the bronze turkeys of John Whitney and Marvin Shaw took easy money. Dr. Grant, the judge, said that the B. R. Plymouth Rocks of the Hartland Poultry Yards were the best he had seen anywhere for years. The Lakeview Poultry Yards of Tracey Mills exhibited excellent Pekin ducks and buff Wyandottes. Among dogs the Newfoundland pup of Ralph and Ray Smith took first prize and their fox terrier; imported from the Birmingham kennels in England attracted attention. A female collie with her pups; an exhibit owned by Norris Whitney, was a great attraction, while the beautiful pair of collies owned by the Hartland Poultry Yards won first prize. The judging this year was all by points; and for the highest points won by a single male and female fowl Premier Hazen awarded a prize of \$10.00. This went to Hartland Poultry yards whose birds scored 96 while Dr. Hagerman was a close second being only two points behind.
