#### The Highway Act.

Jan. 18-1909. To the Editor of "THE DISPATCH:"

Last spring I wrote a letter to you for publication on the subject of The Highway Act. You very considerately gave that letter a prominent place on your first page. I did hope that it would elicit some response from some quarter, some expression of approval or dissent, or pernaps both, but apparently it failed to attract any attention. In that letter I suggested that the control of the roads be given directly to the people who contribute the money by taxation: that the Road Commissioners be elected by the ratepayers at the same time the councillors are elected, and that a full financial report be made to such parish meeting. I will not take up your space with argument on the subject now, but hope that some discus sion of the matter may be had before the Government bring in their bill to amend or change the Act. I am pleased to notice that I am not alone in the thought that this matter should be left to the ratepayers, but that the Albert County Council, if the report of the St. John Sun is correct have placed themselves on record to the same effect.

#### Anglican ChurchNews.

At the meeting of the Anglican Synod com mities in St. John last week, reports of deputations from different parts of the dioces in connection with the increase in stipends were received, showing that the parishes cordially cooperated, with the result that priests of three years' standing in the diocese will receive \$50 increase, and of six years' standing \$100. One of the most important changes in the formation of new mission in Carleton, which will be placed in charge of a priest. Aberdeen, Peel and Brighton, w served by rectors of Woodstock and Wicklow, are now to become separate missions, a clergyman in priest's orders to be appointed as soon as possible.
