Range of Eyesight.

Those who are curious in such matters may, says Youth's Companion, be interested in testing the correctness of the conclusions of Dr. Schaecker of Munich, concerning the distance at which people can be recognized by their faces and figures. If you have good eyes, he says, you cannot recognize a person whom you have seen but once before at a greater distance than 25 meters (82 feet). If the person is well-known to you, you may recognize him at from 50 to 100 meters, and if it is a member of your family, even at 15 meters. The white of the eyes may be seen at from 27 to 28 meters, and the eyes themselves at 72 to 73 meters. The different parts of the body and the slightest movements are discernible at 91 meters. The limbs show at 182 meters. At 540 meters a moving man appears only as an indefinite form, and at 720 meters—2,361.6 feet—the movements of the body are no longer visible.

Goldwin Smith on the Age.

"Then and Now," the title of an article bearing his Christmas message to the students of the Cornell University, which he once taught, shows Goldwin Smith, at the age of 81, still one of the torch bearers of civilization. "Man let the evolutionists remember, advances and rises. The beast does not." Unlike brutes, humanity advances, and we cannot tell what the end will be; whether it may not be the final ascendancy of the spiritual over the material in man." He has witnessed the after-blasts of the French revolution; they have beaten political face of Europe and careered far into the stagnant East. Everywhere he sees democracy triumphant, invading autocratic palaces, and possessing constitutional monarchies like England, with greater force even than our own republic. Indeed, he regards the United States as relatively a backward

nation in the march of democracy. But his almost mystical insight perceives something more momentous in this age than its political move in the advance of science. This is making the nations one commonwealth by providing the means of closer communication. The Suez Canal is transforming India. The locomotive, which bore Greville fifty years ago at the shuddering pace of forty-five miles an hour, will soon by the aid of electricity attain 125 miles an hour covering the whole countryside into a suburb.

His father has been an invalid for years and the loss of the son, who was the manager of the business, is a great blow to him. The sympathy of the whole community goes out to the bereaved family.

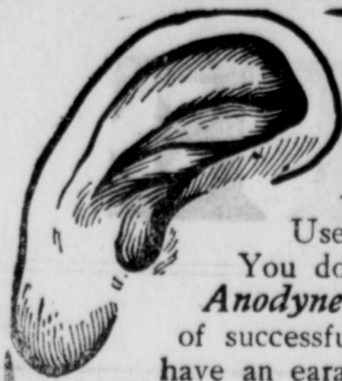
Sapphire and Sapphires.

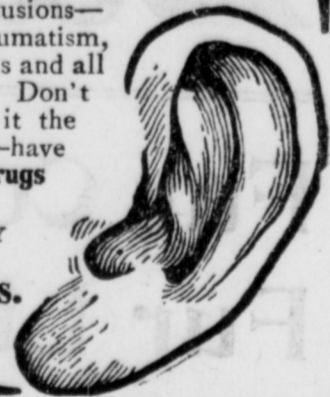
