**World's Sunday School Convention.**

Washington, May 24.—Children took the  
principal part in the closing session tonight  
of the sixth convention of the World's Sun-  
day School Association. The central thought  
of the meeting was, as one speaker expressed  
it, that "the only way to bring about the  
evangelization of the world in this or in any  
other generation, was through the teaching  
of Christ to the children in the Sunday  
school.

International in almost every aspect was  
the closing meeting. There were speakers  
from India, Japan, Korea, and other foreign  
countries; the decorations were flags of the  
nations; and an immense map of the world,  
with an electric cross over it, covered the  
wall at the back of the platform.  
The next convention will meet in Geneva,  
Switzerland, in 1913.

**Buried in the Sea.**

New Orleans, May 21.—There are buried  
cities of magnificent proportions beneath the  
waters of the Caribbean Sea at no very great  
depth, according to Dr. Emil Monsonyi, of  
Budapest, Hungary, a well-known geologist.  
Dr. Monsonyi has spent some time in Cen-  
tral America, principally Guatemala, in arch-  
aeological researches. He arrived here yester-  
day. He says that he is convinced that the  
cities of Central America are not as old  
as they are thought to be. By a terrible cat-

parallel became submerged, causing the des-  
truction of thousands of people. Those on  
the outer edge escaped to North America, he  
said.
