

Infected Trees.

Vancouver, B C, May 26 -The provincial fruit pest inspector held a bonfire here today destroying thirty thousand insect ladened trees from Ontario, the Maritime Provinces, United States, France, Belgium, Germany, and Holiand, part of one million trees shipped to British Columbia this winter. There were enough germs to have horticulturally infested the whole province but no one tree escaped British Columbia inspection, which is said to be the most rigid of any country in the world. British Columbia is practically immune from injurious orchard pests.
