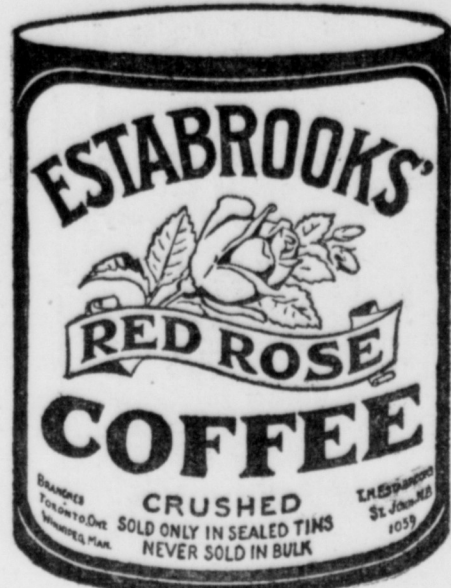


Crushed Coffee— what is it?

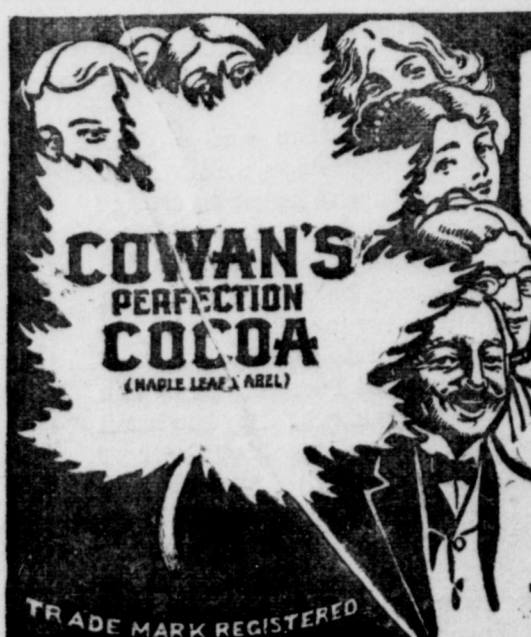
