


#### Fun in the Civil Service.

### **Poultry Notes.**

Barley is a fine feed for chickens as the grain contains a large percentage of ash and assists in bone and egg making.

Corn is a useful feed for hens, but should be used sparing , and it is better at 'at night as a means of sopplying warmth to the body of the poultry.

Millet has special advantages in poultry feeding, as it induces scratching. The millet should of course, be thrown in direct from the mow, leaving the heas to scratch out the seed for themselves.

Leaves and heads of clover from the bot. tom of the mow, or at the end of a feed chute, will make capital feed for hens. The clover may be fed either day or made part of a mash.

Cabbage is one of the best vegetable foods for hens in winter. The cabbage is not only succulent, but contains a large amount of ash and protein. A cool cellar with the cabbage on shelves, or houg from the joists wil be found the best place to keep the vegetables stored.

#### When Skirts are Long.

There is confusion in the minds of many concerning skirts. There is so much talk about smart gowns being five inches from the floor for evening and nearly six inches for morning, that women wonder if there is any hour in which the long, graceful skirt is worn.

The strict decree of fastion is this: Skirts five or six inches from the ground for streetwear, skirts that sweep over the floor in a round train for the afternoon, and skirts five nches from the floor for the evening.

That is the decree! Every one does not have to abide by it, but numbers of women will accept it in part, if not in whole. They may not have every evening gown made short, or every afternoon frock made long, but they will assuredly have one of each kind to show that they know what is being done in the world of fashion.




