Church Building Burned.

The fire department was called out at an early hour Tuesday morning to a fire in the old Albert atreet Baptist church. Some delay was experienced in getting an alarm in, and when the firemen arrived on the scene the building was completely enveloped in flames. After four or five streams were put to work the flames were soon under control. The old tin horn steeple was the last part of the building to fall. Shortly after the amalgamation of the Baptist bodies, this building was purchased by ex-Ald A F Fawcett who is now on a western trip, and it was his intention to remodel it into a double tenement, the lumber for which purpose was stored in a shed in the rear of the church.

The building had been used until a short time ago as a practise room for the basket ball team. During the last few weeks the door has been left open and there is no doubt resigned his position. the fire was of incendiary origin.

In connection with the reported purchase of the Anglo-American and Montreal Canada Fire Insurance Companies by William Thomson & Co. of St. John, the Montreal Gazette on Friday published the following dispatch from Toronto: "The transfer of the Anglo-American and Montreal Canada Fire Insurance Companies to the firm of William Thomson & Co, St John, (N B), is not to be brought about without proceedings in the courts. Suit has already been entered in the High Court by Wm. McComb, 81 Isabella street, for specific performance of an agreement in which it is alleged, H. H. Beck, the manager, agreed to transfer to Mr. McComb his shares, and to use his best endeavors to obtain the shares of directors until 3.612 or 57 per cent of the total, were in the hands of Mr. McComb. Mr. McComb, who was acting for a United States syndicate, believing that Mr. Beck did not intend to carry out the alleged agreement, obtained an injunction at Osgoode Hall restraining Messrs Beck or William Thompson, the later, a C. Tariff Arranged.

Washington, Mar, 26 .- General satisfaction is expressed here at the announcement made today that an agreement practically has been reached between the officials representing the Canadian Government and the president and Secretary Knox respecting the adjustment of the tariffs of Canada and the United States. No one in authority is willing to discuss the details but there is good ground for the belief that material concessions have been granted by Canada, and that the United States will receive in return for its minimum the intermediate rates given by Canada to France and twelve other countries, on a considerable number of articles in which exporters from the United States are specially interested.

This understanding is said to have been reached after a prolonged conference today, participated in by President Taft; W. S. Fielding, the Canadian minister of finance; George P. Graham, the Canadian minister of railways; Secretary of State, Knox; and Charles M. Pepper, of the bureau of trade relations of the state department.

Under the existing treaty between Canada and France the latter country receives the conventional rate on about 90 articles.
