Drop in the Price of Potatoes.

Mr. S. Kirkpatrick, Canadian trade commissioner at Havana, warns Canadian potato shippers that the Cuban potato market has collapsed. The new Cuban crop, he writes, was on the market, and the best information estimates it at 90,000 barrels. Though these could not be kept for any length of time, they were being quoted at from \$1.50 to \$1.75 Spanish gold per 100 pounds, or about 9 per cent. less in United States currency. These native potatoes would practically control the market for the next few months, although a certain quantity would still be imported. Brokers, so Mr. Kirkpatrick adds, found it hard to get buyers for Canadian stock at present at \$1.50 per barrel c. i. f., and at that price it was impossible to ship them. There were no indications that the price would improve.
