Fire destroyed the smoke house, pig sty and 800 pounds of pork belonging to M H Taylor of Church Hill. Andover, early last Monday morning. Five live pigs which were in the pen at the time of the fire were saved being driven forcibly through the blinding smoke by Percy Murphy and placed in a shelter of safety. The vacant dwelling on the property was not destroyed.

The origin of the fire is a mystery since at 6 o'clock on Sunday night an inspection by Mr Taylor showed everything to be apparently safe. It is strongly believed, however that the fire originated from the inside.

The loss to Mr Taylor is severe as there was no insurance. The blow is heavy, too, because of the fact that he has been conducting the bacon-curing business since only last April. Mr Taylor stated, however, that he would build again as soon as possible and will be better fitted to care for his fast increasing custom.

Mr Warren C Winslow, a leading barrister and former mayor of Chatham, died on Christmas morning. Mr Winslow was a son of the late Francis Winslow and was born at Chatham, January 6 1861. He leaves a widow and six children to mourn. Mrs Winslow was formerly Miss Carvill, of St John, and the children are Pelham F, Bank of Montreal, Toronto; Frank Warren, Vancouver; Arthur O, Regina; Margaret, Mary and Edith at home. One brother and three sisters also survive. These are: Mr E P Winslow, Bank of Montreal inspector, Toronto; Mrs H Montgomery Campbell, Sussex; Mrs William A Park, Newcastle and Miss Constance Winslow, Toronto. The late Mr Winslow was a graduate in law of Harvard. He was a Liberal in politics, a prominent member of the Knights of Columbus and one of the best known men on the North Shore.—St John Globe.

IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT

Although the British Parliament is called to meet on Jan 31st, it is expected the date of meeting will be changed to about the middle of February, to allow the ministers time for a rest and to prepare for the coming session. The first thing to be done after the opening will be to present again the parliament Bill, which deals with the House of Lords question. This will be followed by an Electoral Reform Bill, which will abolish plural voting and establish the one man one vote principle, and also provide that all elections shall take place on one day, as well as make other important changes. Plural voting and elections spread over a fortnight have always handicapped the liberal party—some politicians say to the extent of forty seats. At the general elections in January it was shown that rich Londoners voted in eight constituencies. It is surely time for a change.—St John Globe.

Pullman Company to Cut Rates.

Montreal, Dec 27.—It was definitely announced here today by the Pullman Company that a reduction of 20 per cent would be made in its price for upper berths in Canada, on lines including the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific.
