**County Council.**  
(Official Report.)  
Woodstock, N. B.  
Jan. 10th, 1910.

For the first time in the history of Carleton County, the January session of the County Council was held in the town of Woodstock. The main room of the Court House is not yet completed, it being decided not to rush matters, but to have the finish thoroughly done. Consequently the meeting place of the council was the Grand Jury room, a large room upstairs facing Main street. While the space was somewhat limited there was no very inconvenient crowding.

Coun. Melville—I have been asked at different times as to the conditions of our loans. Coun. Balmain—They are sold at 96½. We will have a report tomorrow.

Coun Smith asked as to two items \$19.60 and \$6.90. It was explained that these items were in connection with changes made in the heating apparatus of the Record office.

Coun. Phillips, reporting on the Court House, said that it would be all ready for use at the session of the March Court. There is now \$10,000 insurance on the building by the county.

Coun. Balmain—I think it was a distinct understanding last summer that a certain time would be specified when the Court House was to be completed, and I think that time was at the session of the council the following January, and that a penalty should be provided to be paid by the contractors if they failed in the completion of the work within the time specified.

Sec-treas.—There is a clause in the contract making \$10.00 a day forfeiture for every day after the time set for completion. You could exact that, but I hardly think you could show you have suffered any actual damage that these terms were put in the contract.

Coun. Phillips—We spoke of this matter with the foreman Mr. Edgett. He said the work could be rushed so as to be finished within the time, but it might not give satisfaction, and we thought it better to take a little more time than to ask him to rush the work.

Coun. Melville—In talking the matter over, I was told that the building could be got ready, but I thought we would be in a better position if we gave him more time. We have had no reason to complain of Mr Corbett, the contractor. We expected we would have had trouble, but he has given every satisfaction. He is a first class contractor and we have had no trouble at all. He took the contract cheap and we thought we would give him every sympathy, and would waive any little inconvenience.

Coun. Balmain—I think the contractor and the foreman are the two best men for that sort of work in the province to day, and I am well satisfied. I only asked for satisfaction.

Council then adjourned until 1.30 P. M. On resuming after dinner the annual report of the Local Board of Health was read as follows.
