PETER JUDGE, 62 years of age, died suddenly in St. Stephen on Thursday of last week. He is survived by three brothers, Charles, of St. Andrews, Joseph, of Perth, and Hugh, of Woodstock.

HARRY TRAFORD, son of Mr. Charles and Mrs. Traford, who has been afflicted with epileptic fits for 47 years, and in consequence has been a great care to his parents, died on the 12th inst. aged 48 years. Notwithstanding the care involved, Harry has been the subject of the tenderest care from the whole family and especially of his father and mother. His remains were interred in the cemetery at Green Bank.

CHARLES TRAFORD, an old and well known citizen of Woodstock, died at his home here on Monday morning, after a short illness of pneumonia. He was 81 years of age and is survived by a widow, two sons, Rev. G. B., of Marysville, Arthur, of California and one daughter, Mrs. Ed. London, of Canterbury Station. The funeral took place on Tuesday, the Rev. S. A. Baker officiating. The remains were interred in the cemetery at Northampton.

APPLICATION will be made at the coming session of the Legislature to amend Chapter 54 of the Acts of Assembly passed in the fifty third year of the reign of Queen Victoria so as to provide for the purchase, establishment and maintenance of a free public park for the benefit of the citizens of the Town of Woodstock. This act relates to monies left by the late John Connell for school purposes. We understand that Bull's Island has been purchased from Charles F. Rogers and the money paid over from this fund. This will be good news to the people of the town. The island, with the expenditure of a little money, can be made an ideal park and pleasure resort.

THE trial of Newell Pennell, an Indian, charged with abducting Tola, the 13 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Milton McBride, of Cloverdale, was held before Police Magistrate Dibble on Monday morning. According to the evidence of Mrs. Milton, the girl left home without her permission. The Indian, whose camp is a short distance from the Milton's home, boarded with them while his camp was being built, and became friendly with the girl. When Mrs. Milton found that the girl had gone with Pennell, she telephoned to the police and the pair was arrested in Woodstock. After hearing the evidence of A. R. Foster and Marshal Kelly, the magistrate remanded Pennell to jail until the March term of the County Court, unless bonds be given for his appearance.

JOHN BLACKIE, proprietor of the Queen Hotel, had a pocket-book containing over \$200.00 stolen from his clothes some time early on Sunday morning. The pocket-book and a small sum of money were found but the thief took away with him \$169.00. Suspicion rested on a man named Daley, who stopped at the hotel Saturday night and left early on Sunday morning. The police were notified and immediately started out to look for him. They found that Daley had called at the home of Albert McBride, on Connell Road, and had told him he had robbed a bank in Woodstock and offered him a sum of money if he would drive him to the other side of the border. This McBride refused to do, and Daley left and started towards Houlton. A man whose description tallied with Daley, was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Armstrong, and again released on giving an apparently satisfactory account of himself.

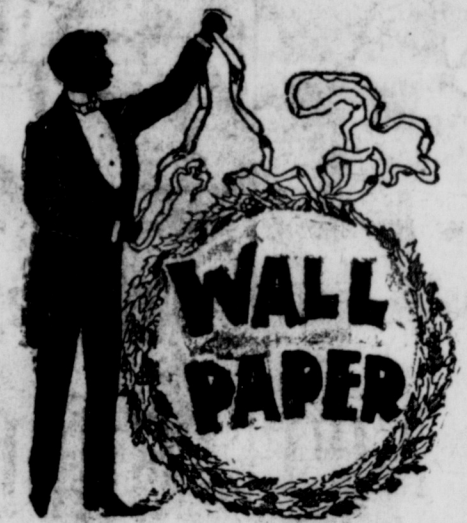
