\$1.50 for Uppers, Lovers \$2.50
(Montreal Herald.)

Upper berths, one dollar and a half. Lower berths, two dollars and a half. Such is the policy of the railway and pullman officials for declaration before the Railway Commission on the 15th.

When the question of sleeping berth rates comes up the officials will acquiesce in the lowering of the tariff for upper births from two dollars to a dollar and a half for the all-night trip, but will insist upon the raising of the lower berth to two and a half dollars, thus maintaining the revenue for the section at the same figure as now.

A leading official who made this announcement to the Herald said the profits on sleeping berths are very small, but it was impossible to make them pay on any other basis than the maintenance of the present section rates.

The companies are willing to accept the ruling of Chief Commissioner Mabee with regard to the discontinuance of the practice of reserving berths that are pre-paid for until a late hour in the day, and to adopt the cash principle as the only basis of reservation. They will, however, contend that passengers reserving berths by telegram when in transit from one point to another should have their reservations honored. They say that sales are sometimes lost through persons reserving berths for practically an entire day and then deciding to postpone their contemplated trips.

King Edward VII.

The following is an extract from a letter received by one of our readers, from a friend in England.

1910 has been a sad year and now our good King has gone. His death came so suddenly and unexpectedly too. I saw the funeral on Friday last, and what a sight it was, one that will never be forgotten by any one who saw it—for it was most impressive. It was really a splendid sight, and to see so many crowned heads together, seems almost unparalleled. The day was perfect, fine and bright and not too hot, though a good many people were overcome by the heat of the sun and standing too long. I got up at five o'clock to secure the place I had set my mind on opposite Hyde Park Corner and I got a grand position where I could see it all. I suppose never before has there been such a crowd in London. I simply cannot describe it, it alone was a marvellous sight and all so orderly and well behaved, no hitch at all any where. As far as you could see Hyde Park was nothing but a mass of people, and thousands upon thousands of them could not possibly have seen anything as they were much too far away. All along the route from Westminster to Paddington there was not a single place on the streets, house-tops, windows and everywhere that was not crowded with people. One wondered where they had all come from. The decorations too, were really very pretty, so uniform everywhere, just the Royal purple drapings with white tassels and wreaths of laurel leaves. I wish you could have seen it all. Certainly no King was ever more beloved by everyone than King Edward VII. He was so thoroughly popular and had such a nice way of doing everything and such tact. England could ill afford to lose him just now. But we can only hope that King George will turn out to be as good a King as his father was. I quite expect he will.

Prayer

The men in whose lives has developed a great prayer passion have been the men who have moved the world. Look at Robert Hall of Leicester. He would come from his vestry so weak in body from struggling in prayer before God that he would have to hold on to his pulpit when he stood to preach. But as he proceeded with the sermon the people would rise in their seats unconsciously and come streaming up the aisles, crowding around the pulpit so that it actually became necessary to put locks on the pew doors and lock the people in. And to this day you may see the remains of the locks in the old Harvey Lane Chapel. Or look at Catherine of Siena. She was a wool dyer's daughter and taught herself to read and write. But when she came to womanhood she was sought for by Kings and Queens and Princes and Popes that they might have her advice and prayers. She would go into what we might call a trance, communing with her Lord, when for hours she would seem to forget every-thing else. She was only a wool dyer's daughter, but she moved the world by prayer. And there is no favoritism with God. You and I may possess the same secret and be master workmen in the kingdom of grace—Rev. J. W. Mahood, D. D.; in The Master workman."
