past few weeks.

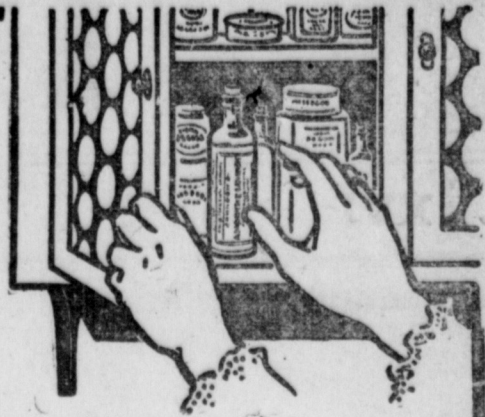
Potatoes are now worth forty cents per
