the outside, and so Mr Cutten offered to the Baptist people of the Maritime Provinces, Acadia as an investment and humorously and earnestly he pressed home his message.

SUNDAY MORNING

The Convention sermon was preached by the Rev ED Webber, B A, of Wolfville, and was a masterful discourse. The text was John 1-14, and the chief points were: Our knowledge of God comes through Christ. The value of man according to human estimates. The value of man in Christ. It was a thoroughly helpful and inspiring message.

At the Methodist church was the Rev J H Jenner, M A, whose text was Isaiah 45-5. The Hand of God in Human History.

At the Presbyterian church was the Rev J W Smith, of Yarmouth, whose text was, Psalm 146-5. Jacob a study in Human Destiny. Singularly enough these two ministers spoke nearly the same message, the former in a general, and the latter in a particular manner. Jenner carried his audience like a flood. Smith held his spellbound.

The afternoon session of the Convention was devoted to the Adult Bible Class Movement.

Mr Lawson gave his time to a Missionary from Persia, who enthralled his audience with an account of the work there.

Stackhouse cited the prosperity of fraternal societies, and the public house as showing the persistence of the social instinct in men. "I stand for men," should be the motto of the Adult Bible Class Movement. Lewis' great point was that the Adult Bible class creates for a minister a sphere of influence. The movement makes most of the herding instinct of men, Cutten denied that men were not in the church, and referred to the business men in every town as being nearly all christians. Men and women should lead their own children to Sunday School. Churches should be run strictly on business principles.

In the afternoon the Salvation Army people were delighted beyond measure because they had the Rev C G Pincomb, of Jemseg, speak to them from Acts 9.6. Pincombe has been a military man in the British army, and was Orderly to Lord Welsley in Egypt, 1882. He has the manner and bearing of a cultured Englishman, and his wide army experiences were relished very much by the big audience.

The evening session of the convention was given up largely to the Laymen's Missionary Movement. The speakers were W C Cross of St John, who urged the convention to be content with nothing less than 80 missionaries on the Foreign Mission Field at a cost of \$125,000.

The Rev Mr Dixon a returned missionary from Assam who spoke of the inception of the L M Movement followed.

The Rev Mr Schurman of Campbelltown, raised the convention to a high pitch of enthusiasm as he described the heroism exhibited during the great fire. He pleaded for the active sympathy of the convention towards the church in Campbelltown which needs a church building and a parsonage.

The organists and choir deserve much praise for the high quality of the music they have provided at the evening sessions.

Mr Wetmore sang several solos very acceptably.

The Rev W J Rutledge, of Brunswick, U S, occupied the pulpit of the Advent church. His subject was Christian assurance, from the Epistles to Timothy, 'I know whom I have trusted, etc.

He lighted up his subject with the wit and eloquence derived from his Scotch-Irish ancestry. He was much at home among those delightful people of this church.

At the Methodist church the Rev P J Stackhouse, B D, of Amherst, N S, preached an acute and penetrating sermon to a fine congregation on the Loving Father and the Great Father's Heart toward fallen Humanity. The choir excelled themselves.

The pulpit of the Reformed Baptist church was occupied by the Rev J W Bancroft, of Deerville, N S. His magnificent presence was well sustained by a sermon of great eloquence and profound thought lucidly expressed on Acts 17.28.

MONDAY.

Today's session opened auspiciously with the report of the U S Home Mission Board, submitted by the Secretary the Rev I W Porter, B A.

The convention heartily endorsed the policy of the Board and many complimentary things were said of Mr Porter. He is much loved by Ministers on the Home Mission Fields and no greater can come to him.

At the afternoon session the report of the F M Board was the chief topic of discussion. This was preceded by the usual courtesies to visiting ministers of the other denominations in the town.

The most vital part of the Foreign Mission Report, was a section recommending a union of the Foreign Mission interests of Canadian Baptists under one Board. The Revs I W Porter and J M Smith moved and seconded the acceptance of the basis of Union which was carried unanimously. This is a most important action and means much for the Baptist church in Canada and India.

Reports from Western Missions and Grand Ligne Mission were submitted, prosperity and progress along the whole line of activity. There was also a full report from the committee on Temperance and moral Reform.

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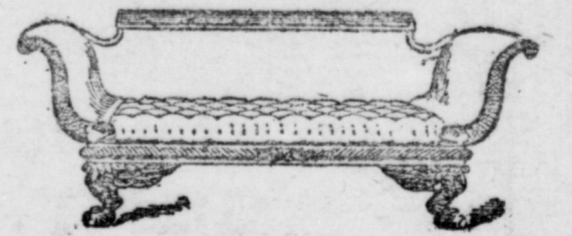
