Coun Smith would like to see something done by which prisoners in the jail could be made to work on the roads or in some other way. He moved that a committee be appointed to look into this matter. Motiou seconded by Coun Scott and carried.

Coan Tracy asked as to the old court house property at Upper Woodstock. Coun Phillips-It is leased to Upper Woodstock District till the first of January

next for \$16 00 a year.

Coun Melvil'e moved that the building committee be anthorized to issue tanders for the purchase of the land and building and report te the council next January. Cour Lamont seconded the motion.

Coun Scott thought the people of Upper Woodstock should be given this property, from a moral point of view. if for no other reason.
