**County Council.**

Continued from last week.

It was moved by Coun Melville, seconded  
by Coun Lamont that the term suggested by  
Mr Green be adopted. This means a cost  
of \$3.00 each for the councillors. (It does  
not mean any charge to the County.) It will  
include a large framed photograph for the  
Council room.

Coun Phillips said the report of the build-  
ing Committee would be ready after dinner—  
The committee was allowed this further time

The Warden speaking of the delegation to  
the convention of the Municipalities at Camp-  
bellton spoke of what led to delegates attend-  
ing. The Council had met, but he got in touch  
with all the councillors and fourteen of them  
were in favor of the motion, seven were  
against. Under these circumstances and in  
view of the expressed opinion he had dele-  
gated Couns Balmaln and Tracey, going him-  
self on his own responsibility.

Coun Balmaln, spoke of his trip and the  
convention, pointing out the use of the con-  
vention, the lessons to be learned, and the  
necessity of this County joining in such a  
movement. There were about 75 attended  
the convention. Important matters were  
brought before the convention, discussed and  
recommendations carried before the legisla-  
ture in the matter of legislation affecting the  
County.

Everyone expressed himself as having en-  
joyed the convention and that it was an ex-  
cellent trip. York sent from that county  
six representatives and the Council voted \$40  
a piece for its representatives. In regard to  
the meetings, they were orderly conducted in  
a thorough business like manner, and the  
banquet given to the visitors was noted for  
its abstemiousness of those attending.

Coun Tracey spoke of the convention. He  
thanked the council for sending him. He  
was strongly in favor of the Union of the  
the Municipalities.

The meeting in Campbellton was said to  
be the best in the history of the movement.  
Of 83 municipalities 23 are now on the mem-  
bership roll. The councillor's report of the  
proceedings is as follows:

The fourth annual convention of the union  
of Municipalities of the province, met at  
Campbellton on Feb 16th and 17th, and was  
considered to be the best in the history of the  
Union, and the report of the Secretary showed  
that of the 83 Municipalities of the provin-  
ce 23 are now enrolled as active members  
of the Union. The first session opened at  
11 o'clock of Wednesday morning with Pres.  
Chestnut in the chair. The Sec. of the Can-  
adian Union wired his regrets that he would  
not be able to attend. Hon John Morrisay,  
Chief Com. of public works was present as a  
representative of the Government and occu-  
pled a seat upon the platform throughout the  
convention.

Mayor Murray tendered a hearty welcome  
to the reunion, and made a very pleasant ad-  
dress and certainly made all the delegates  
feel welcome indeed. Mayor Reilly of Mon-  
cton and others made suitable replies.

Pres Chestnut then delivered his address  
which was lengthy to repeat. He dealt in  
particular with the system of Uniform ac-  
counting and with regard to the establish-  
ment of a laboratory for the purpose of mak-  
ing chemical and bacteriological analysis by  
the Provincial Government. On motion the  
address was referred to the Executive for  
consideration.

The report of the Sec Treas J W McCready  
was next submitted. He referred mostly to  
his trip to the West as a delegate to the Can-  
adian Union, and gave some very interesting  
information. The statement of receipts and  
expenditure was also read by the Secretary  
and showed a balance on hand of \$253.30

The following were appointed to the execu-  
tive to fill vacancies Mayor Reilly, Warden  
Gilbert, Ald McGoldrick, Coun Sterling,  
Mayor Miller, Coun Polley and Coun Siddall

At the opening of the afternoon session  
Hon John Morrisay delivered his address.  
His chief subject was the Highway Act. In  
conclusion, he said that it was the intention  
of the Government to place a liberal amount  
of money at the disposal of the Highway  
Boards this year.

The Hghway Act was then taken up and  
oroughly discussed. Some were satis-  
fied with the working of the Act and some  
were not. Coun Flewelling asked if the  
Government grant was to be distributed through  
the Highway Boards or through the  
members of the Commis. The Coun  
replied that the patronage system still exist-  
ed and he could not say anything about the  
matter outside his own County where the  
money would be expended by the Highway  
Board.

It was moved by Secretary that a committee  
be appointed to ask the Government that  
a laboratory be established in con-  
nection with the University of New  
Brunswick as soon as possible. After some  
remarks the resolution passed and com-  
mittee appointed. At the evening ses-  
sion Rev F Hunter Boyd spoke on the  
prevention of tuberculosis.

The question of Uniform Statistic and  
accounting was also taken up and discussed.  
On Tuesday morning Ald McGoldrick

opened a discussion of telephone rates charg-  
ed by the N B Telephone Co and introduced  
the following resolution that the local gov-  
ernment be memorialized to amend the act  
respecting Telephone Co so as to provide  
that telephone rates and bills cannot be in-  
creased without the approval of the Lieut-  
enant Governor in Council, and upon hear-  
ing of all parties concerned who may desire  
to oppose such increase. The resolution was  
strongly opposed by some, but was finally  
adopted unanimously.

The next item on the program was a paper  
on roadmaking by A R Wetmore, but who  
was unable to be there. Other questions  
such as taxation on water supplies owned by  
cities or towns outside the town limits were  
taken up.

At the afternoon session it was moved that  
the Committee endorse the work of the so-  
ciety for the prevention of Tuberculosis and  
recommends the co-operation of the individ-  
ual municipalities in the work; this motion  
was adopted. A motion was also introduced  
asking that the legislature amend the Act re-  
lating to rates and taxes so that no board  
of Assessors should allow any ratepayer any ex-  
emption from taxation by reason of indebted-  
ness unless an affidavit is made showing the  
amount and nature of such indebtedness and  
to whom such indebtedness is owing. The  
motion carried unanimously.

The president then read a paper on econo-  
mics and principals of McAdam Construction  
for towns, which was lengthy too repeat.

The paper was very favorably received and  
a vote of thanks tendered Mr Black, City  
Engineer of Campbelltown.

Then followed a discussion on the export  
duty on pulpwood. There also was a discus-  
sion on the public health act. A resolution  
was also passed asking that the time for  
hunting big game be extending to the 31st  
of December for residents.

Woodstock was selected for the next place  
meeting. Election of officers resulted as fol-  
lows: Pres., Mayor Reilly, Moncton; Sec  
Treas, J W McCready; Executive:—Mayor  
Miller, Coun Sterling, Mayor Jones, Coun  
Siddall, Ald McGoldrick, Warden Legere,  
Mayor Chestnut, Coun Mowatt, Coun Polley  
Mayor Reilly then took the chair, thanked  
the Convention for the honor done him. Af-  
ter the usual vote of thanks the Convention  
adjourned. In the evening the delegates were  
the guests of the Mayor and Council of Cam-  
pbellton at the Minto Hotel, where a very  
pleasant evening was spent until the arrival  
of the train which conveyed the delegates to  
their homes.

**COUNCIL BUSINESS.**

Coun Melville asked if the highway boards  
held the money. It was rumored that might  
not be the case. The warden said there was  
a misunderstanding about what the commis-  
sioner for public works said at the meeting.  
What he said was he did not know what the  
committee would do in the disposition of the  
patronage of the money, but in Northumber-  
land the highway board would have the hand-  
ling of the money as usual.  
Council adjourned till 1.30.

**AFTERNOON SESSION.**

On re-assembling a motion was passed ac-  
cepting an invitation of the Woodstock Auto  
Club to take the members of the council for  
an auto ride this evening.

It was resolved that the meeting of the  
Good Roads Association be held in the Court  
House this evening.

Coun Phillips read the following report  
of the building committee:—

**BUILDING COMMITTEE'S REPORT.**

Woodstock, N B, June 20, 1910.  
To the County Council of Carleton Co.  
Gentlemen:—Your Building Committee to  
whom was entrusted the erection and furnish-  
ing of a new Court House in the Town of  
Woodstock beg to submit the following re-  
port,—

1. We have attended to the duty imposed  
upon us and have the said Court House fully  
completed and furnished with the exception  
of the grounds, and all bills are paid except  
a balance of \$65.00 on the furniture and a  
portion of the cost of grading, etc the  
grounds around said Court House which we  
are unable to mention at this time, but we  
hope to have almost enough left out of the  
proceeds of the sale of the debentures to com-  
plete the whole work.

2 We have negotiated and sold \$31,000  
of debentures receiving therefor with accrued  
interest less discounts and exchange the sum  
of \$30,512.26.

3. We have expended to date the sum of  
\$30,270.95 leaving a balance on hand to com-  
plete the work of \$241.41 which we hope  
will be sufficient.

4. Out of the above expenditure over  
\$1000 has been expended in repairs to the  
Record Office or rather in repairs and im-  
provements to same so that the Court House  
with the addition of the discount and ex-  
change on the bonds, cost complete \$30,000.  
00 in round numbers. A statement of ac-  
count is attached.

We trust the work of the committee will  
prove satisfactory and beg to remain,
