NITRIC ACID FROM THE AIR

A note of warning has just been sounded in England concerning the backwardness in that country of the development of methods of procuring nitrogen compounds from the atmosphere by means of electricity. It is pointed out that not only do these methods which are beginning to be employed all over Europe, offer a supply of fertilizing material to take the place of natural nitrates, but that nitric acid itself can be made from the nitrogen of the atmosphere, and this acid is essential for the manufacture of the high explosives required for modern guns. The significant question is asked: when other countries are rendering themselves independent of outside sources of this material, what would be England's situation in case of war, if it had to depend for the ability to fire its guns on materials brought thousands of miles across the sea? For The Hungry Autoists

Sandwiches for the quick luncheon by the roadway when a touring party has an all day journey and no surfeit of lunch at the right place, are worthy of consideration by the hostess. Meat sandwiches are seldom good for a roadside lunch. They may, of course, be the small basket of fried chicken or thinly sliced ham, but woman generally prefer the nut or lettuce sandwich—it is fresher and more refreshing.

When cream cheese is used for the sandwich it should always be creamed with the butter—not spread separately. Three parts of cheese to one of butter is the right proportion. With this as a basis, minced nuts of any kind may be sprinkled on the paste, or minced olives, minced Spanish pepper and onions, minced pickles or tender lettuce leaves that have been cooled and wiped perfectly dry. Walnuts alone make a tooth some sandwich killing without any accompaniment except butter.

A good filling with lettuce leaves is the yolk of a hard-boiled egg, creamed with butter, mustard and a dash of paprika and salt.—Commercial Advertiser.

Reindeer to the number of three hundred were taken from Lapland to Labrador and northern Newfoundland three years ago the effort of Dr Wilfred Grenfell. They are thriving in their new home and rapidly increasing in numbers. The success of the experiment gives hope that the presence of this remarkably useful animal will do much to improve the condition of the people of northern lands. The rapid depletion of the seal herds has threatened one of their main food supplies, and the savage nature of the dogs, which the people use for draft animals, has made it impossible to keep the common domestic animals. It is the plan to have the reindeer not only supplant the dog, but also supply milk and meat, clothes and bedding for the inhabitants. Unsuccessful efforts have been made to domesticate the native caribou, but the reindeer now at large are expected to interbreed with the caribou and produce a larger and hardier animal. In this matter, as well as along other lines concerning which more has been written, Doctor Grenfell is accomplishing a most practical missionary work in those northern regions.—Youth's Companion.
