Civic funds

Under the above helding the S Jin Globe has the following El torial which is of interest to us just at present.

At the Woolstock Town Council the other day there was considerable di castion up n an application by an influential deputation for a grant of money to be used lec-ly in a 'carnivat' to be held in the town a couple of weeks here on dars on with there are to be horse races. In the course of the discussion which took place the fact became evident that some members of the Council had I arned a lesson from a recent vote of the cit izens. Moved by the Board of Trade of the town the Counci asked the Legislature to give it author ty to issue bonds to the exter t of ten thousand dollars for the purchase of pearl ring. She received a check from implements to make permanent streets. The council got from the ligitliture the author ty to make the purchase, but the exercise of the authority was dependent upon a popular vote. The v to was taken, but the pople did n t approve. One of the members of the council, referring to this matter when the application for the carnival grant was up, said t ton the referenudm 'wh lesome who were present at the Board of Trade me ti g had voted for the street improvement scheme, some had v. t od ago i st it and many had not noted at all, in spite of the fact hat the resclu ion had been carried unanimously. This did not encourage the council to act on the dealing with publis matters.'

The town council decided not to give any money to the carnival scheme, and that sur-1, was wise after the public decision on the proposed expenditure on a matter of much public impostance. We have not the act of incorporation of the town of Woodstock before us, but if we remember aright it does not give the town council any authority to vote money for carnizals out of the funds which it has legal power to raise. Civic bodies do not always work within their powers, but it sometimes happens that when they do not it is awkward for them. Quebec court some time ago gave a decision which called upon Montreal aldermen who had impropely expended public money t make the expenditure good, out of their own

St John Exhibition New Grand Stand

The new Grand Stand at the Dominion Exhibition, St John, N B, Sept 5th to 15th next, will be almost directly opposite the old structure, which has been removed by the military authorities to make room for a new armory. It will be 208 ft long by 40 feet deep, with comfortable seats for 1,750 people. The plans call for the best of sightseeing facilities, and the ros of seats are so carefully graded that no difficulty will be experienced by any occupant in seeing all that is going on in the fireworks, open-air entertainment and stock-exhibiting departments There will be a ten foot promenade in front of the Grand Stand and a covered bazaar promenade underneath in the rear, as part of the Pike. The aisles will be large and amply wide, making access and egress easy. From this monster point of advantage some of the finest progammes of thrilling feats, pyrotechnics, etc, will be seen
