Civic funds.

Under the above heading the S. J. n Globe has the following Editorial which is of interest to us just at present.

At the Woodstock Town Council the other day there was considerable discussion upon an application by an influential deputation for a grant of money to be used locally in a 'carnival' to be held in the town a couple of weeks hence on days on which there are to be horse races. In the course of the discussion which took place the fact became evident that some members of the Council had learned a lesson from a recent vote of the citizens. Moved by the Board of Trade of the town the Council asked the Legislature to give it authority to issue bonds to the extent of ten thousand dollars for the purchase of implements to make permanent streets. The Council got from the Legislature the authority to make the purchase, but the exercise of the authority was dependent upon a popular vote. The vote was taken, but the people did not approve. One of the members of the Council, referring to this matter when the application for the carnival grant was up, said that on the referendum 'while some who were present at the Board of Trade meeting had voted for the street improvement scheme, some had voted against it and many had not voted at all, in spite of the fact that the resolution had been carried unanimously. This did not encourage the Council to act on the recommendations of outside organizations in dealing with public matters.'

The town council decided not to give any money to the carnival scheme, and that surely was wise after the public decision on the proposed expenditure on a matter of much public importance. We have not the act of incorporation of the town of Woodstock before us, but if we remember a right it does not give the town council any authority to vote money for carnivals out of the funds which it has legal power to raise. Civic bodies do not always work within their powers, but it sometimes happens that when they do not it is awkward for them. A Quebec court some time ago gave a decision which called upon Montreal aldermen who had improperly expended public money to make the expenditure good, out of their own pockets.

Mrs L P Fisher.

After an illness of two months duration, Mrs L P Fisher died at her residence on Friday afternoon at four o'clock. Mrs Fisher caught a severe cold on her return from Nova Scotia last Spring, which developed into an acute form of bronchitis. Although she entirely recovered from this disease, her general health was impaired and her heart grew gradually weaker. She was a woman of unusual energy and vitality and died after the first serious sickness in her long life of 89 years.

Mrs Fisher possessed a sympathetic and generous nature and devoted much of her time and means to charitable and other christian works. Her faith was simple, and wholly devoid of sectarian prejudice. Her Catholic sympathies brought her into close Christian fellowship with more than one denomination in town. She was a woman of devout piety and thorough Biblical knowledge, but she was still more the woman of affairs, who took the initiative in many generous undertakings at home as well as elsewhere. There are not a few of the deserving poor in Woodstock, who will sorely miss the remembrances and invitations of this kindly old lady.

Deceased whose maiden name was Mary DeMile, became the wife of the late L P Fisher about 60 years ago. She is survived by one brother Mr DeMille of Sussex and one sister Mrs Wallace of Lawrencetown, N S, with whom Mrs Fisher spent last winter.

Interment took place on Monday afternoon in the Methodist cemetery.

St John Exhibition New Grand Stand

The new Grand Stand at the Dominion Exhibition, St John, N B, Sept 5th to 15th next, will be almost directly opposite the old structure, which has been removed by the military authorities to make room for a new armory. It will be 208 ft long by 40 feet deep, with comfortable seats for 1,750 people. The plans call for the best of sight-seeing facilities, and the roofs of seats are so carefully graded that no difficulty will be experienced by any occupant in seeing all that is going on in the fireworks, open-air entertainment and stock-exhibiting departments. There will be a ten foot promenade in front of the Grand Stand and a covered bazaar promenade underneath in the rear, as part of the Pike. The aisles will be large and amply wide, making access and egress easy. From this monster point of advantage some of the finest programmes of thrilling feats, pyrotechnics, etc, will be seen
