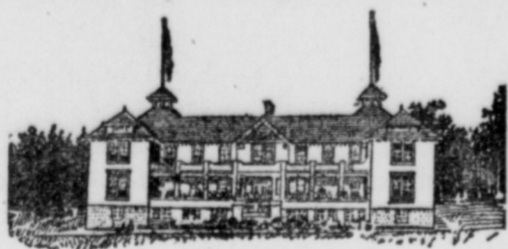

Warm Weather Breads.

(Woman's Home Companion.)

Sweet Milk Graham Muffins.

Mix and sift one cupful of Gram-
ham flour, one cupful of flour, one
fourth of a cupful of sugar, four tea-
spoonfuls of baking-powder and one
teaspoonful of salt. Add gradually
while stirring or beating constantly,
one cupful of milk, one egg well
beaten and one tablespoonful of
butter, fill buttered gem-pans two-
thirds full of mixture and bake in a
hot oven 55 minutes.

Baking-Powder Biscuits.

Mix and sift twice two cupfuls of

flour, four teaspoonfuls of baking
powder and one-half teaspoonful of
salt. Work in two tablespoonfuls
of butter with tips of fingers and
add gradually three-fourths of a cup-
ful of milk, mixing quickly with a
case knife. Cut out and bake in a
quick oven.

Luncheon Rolls.

Toss a baking-powder mixture
on a floured board and pat and roll
to one fourth of an inch in thickness
keeping in rectangular shape.
Brush over with melted butter and
sprinkle with two tablespoonfuls of
sugar mixed with one-half teaspoon-
ful of cinnamon, one-third of a cup-
ful of stoned raisins cut in small
pieces and two tablespoonfuls of
nutmeats. Roll like a jelly-roll and
cut off pieces three-fourths of an
inch in thickness. Place on a but-
tered tin, cut side up and bake in a
hot oven fifteen minutes.

Of Interest To N. B. Fruit Growers.

The Provincial Department of Agriculture
through A. G. Turney, Horticulturist, is
prepared to assist all those who wish advice
in regard to planting apple, plum, and
cherry trees or small fruits in the spring of
1911 if they will write him at Fredericton
stating particulars in regard to site and soil
upon which it is intended to plant, what
crops are growing thereon this summer,
whether the orchard is intended chiefly for
home use or for market and stating any
special preference for certain varieties of
apples, etc.

With a knowledge of these particulars,
Mr Turney will be able to give the enquirer
advice based upon his study of conditions
and the suitability of varieties to the various
parts of the Province. He will also under-
take to place and personally select any
orders sent to him from the very best stock
grown in the province, so long as the supply
lasts and after that from reliable Canadian
firms elsewhere. By taking this course the
purchasers may avoid planting undesirable
varieties and loss through misrepresentation
and mistaken advice from unreliable agents.
It is urged that orders for 1911 be placed as
early as possible this year so that the stock
may be early selected and only the best trees
taken. Later orders will, of course, have to
be filled from what is left after selected stock
is booked.

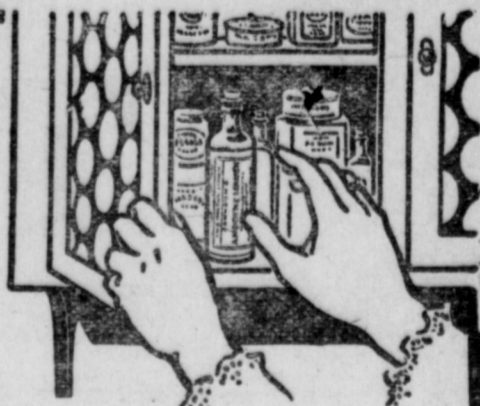
