200 Men on Drive.

Word received by local lumbermen is to the effect that 200 men are employed in trying to get the logs which were in the Big Rapids jam and which have since been reported stranded again to the Upper Corporation limits of the St John River. The logs have not been abandoned and every effort will be made to get them out to the Corporation limits as soon as possible.

If this rain, which has reached up river, keeps up long enough and hard enough it may enable the lumbermen to get the drive to the Corporation limits. The last word from up river is to the effect that logs have been running ahead of the drives to as far as Willard's Bar, about nine miles above the Corporation limits.

At Van Buren, Me, it rained some last night, and was still raining this morning, but up to shortly before noon there had not been any heavy rain such as has fallen here today. Other up river points report about the same weather conditions.—Fredericton Gleaner.

LUMBER ORDER MAY

MAY SOON BE RELAXED.

OTTAWA, June 19.—F. M. Halstead law clerk of the customs branch of the United States Treasury department is here today on a mission that means much to the Canadian lumber trade. Mr. Halstead has been commissioned by the United States government

to enquire into the operative effects of a recent order of the Treasury department calling upon all shippers of lumber to give most specific details of shipments going across the border. They are called upon to state the size and dimensions and the number of pieces in each carload shipped.

It has been represented to the United States Government, not only by the shippers but by the importers as well, that the regulation revolves undue hardship and annoyance which is not calculated to decrease the price of the commodity.

Upon the investigation which the official will make will likely depend whether or not the order will be relaxed. Mr Halstead called on the United States Consul General this morning, and afterwards visited a number of lumbering concerns of the city.

Billion Dollar Trade in Sight.

Ottawa, June 20—The figures of Canadian trade for May, issued today, show another record advance over last year. The total trade for the month was \$59,187,972, an increase of \$14,276,236, or more than thirty per cent as compared with May of last year.

The imports totalled \$38,821,963, an increase of more than \$10,500,000, and the largest increase on record for any one month.

Of the first two months of the current fiscal year the total trade of Canada was \$105,171,866, an increase of \$25,250,000, as compared with the corresponding months of last year.

The exports of domestic products totalled \$18,347,432 an increase of \$2,737,225.

The imports of foreign products totalled \$18,347,432 an increase of \$2,537,225. The exports of foreign products totalled \$2,018,577 an increase of more than \$1,000,000.

At the present rate of increase, Canada's total trade will within two years reach the billion-dollar-a-year mark. For the current year, indications point to a total trade of more than \$800,000,000.

The custom revenue for last month was \$5,818,490, an increase of \$1,576,170, as compared with the corresponding month of last year.
