When Canada Leads.

Not in the least among the distinctions held by Canada is the lead given to all other countries in Christendom in the movement toward the reunion of the Church. Australia is first to follow Canada in a serious and hopeful effort for the organic union of the Presbyterian, Methodist, and Congregational denominations. Conditions there are not unlike conditions here. The same ecclesiastical divisions were imported from Britain and persisted in both countries, working the same waste and weakness. There as here the best men in all the Churches came to feel the burden and the shame of their outgrown sectarianism. They learned that truth is above all creeds. and that service to men is more obligatory than the maintenance of names and shibboleths. Experience proved to them that neither at home nor abroad can the Church do its great work of evangelization if its campaigns are marked by neglect here, overlapping there, and cross-purposes everywhere. They faced the situation with open eyes and honest hearts. As in Canada, so in Australia, the result is a union move-

The Canadian situation is full of interest A half dozen years ago the union movement was initiated. It was not a matter of official leaders or ecclesiastics. It arose out of the necessities of the case and the temper of the people. At its inauguration its most conspicuous advocate was the late Principal Caven. He and others have been taken from the forefront, but the movement goes on.

At each seemingly critical time the logic of events-the increasing purpose of God-disproved the fears of its friends and overcame the conservatism of its opponents. Today 35,00 the union in Canada of these three historic churches, Presbyrerian, Mathodist, Congrega ional, seems plainty inevitable, And this too, not because of any commanding person-30.00 ality or well planned campaign, but because 20.00 it is the common-sense and Christian thing to do. Almost everybody has preferences and prejudices, but these gradually vanish in the presence of recognized Christian duty and in the face of a gigantic world service.

At the present time the approved documents are before the various courts and re presentative bodies of the churches. The question fer their consideration and decision is as to the suitablity of the proposed articles as a basis of union. To that question the intelligence and conscience of the Churches are directed by their supreme courts. And in all this Canada leads the way, watched sympathetically, hopefully, by all other coun tries under the flag, by the United States and by Christion communities in all lands. It is a distinction worth while.-Toronto Globe.

The Portuguese Republic will have an opportunity to do some notable house-cleaning. and of all the 'unclean parts,' as the 'Tribune expresses it, there is none where the world will watch the new broom at work with so much downright satisfaction as in the cellar where Portugal's African affairs have been rotting for four centuries. As long ago as 1829 Portugal promised to abolish slavery al together, but during the next decade the slave traffic from her African coast had more than trebled, and when the American Contederacy declared against the traffic in 1861 the same coast was still the world's slave market. At the time when Portugal, at the Berlln Conference of 1885, promised with all the world, to abolish slavery, her African possessions were worked by slaves, and the same state of affairs existed when King Manuel fled from Lisbon the other day, and the green and sed flag of the Republic was run up on what had been his palace. English travellers relate that in one of the native dialects of Portuguede West Africa the word 'okalunga' means four things; 'death,' 'the depths of the sea,' 'hell' and 'the islands.' 'The islands'—the only islands of which most of the natives have ever heard-are San Thome and Principe, two scraps of land in the Gulf of Guinea. San Thome is about thirty-five miles long and fifteen broad, and the equator runs across the rocks at its south ern end. Principe, perhaps one-fourth as large, lies eighty miles to the north. In the 'wet' season they are flooded with rain; in the 'dry' season they are drenched with the mists that steam up from the tropic sea about them. In the fearful heat there the cocoa tree flourishes and men grow sick. Forty thousand slaves work on these islands to day. The cocoa they produce is one-fifth of the world's whole supply, and of the slaves them selves one-third die every year. It is for the sake of the island planters that Portugal has encouraged slavery; and the way the slaves are procured and treated is so infamous that it cannot be written down for the public to read. The Portuguese monarchy promised to wipe out this blot again and again, but tailed. remains to be seen whether the Republic will be more humane. - Montreal Witness.

Horrible Scenes at Forest Fires

The New York American, in describing some of the scenes in connection with the re cent forest fires in Minnesota, says:

"Hundreds of settlers and their families, on horseback, in waggons and on foot, fled through the woods of Northern Minnesota to the broad and deep Rainy River, which divides the Un ted States and Canada. They crossed it at fords, by boats, by swimming, by any means to reach Canada and safety.

"With them fled their cattle, and mingled w th the cattle, and even surrounding the settlers themselves, raced hundreds of deer caribou and moose. Along the Minnesota banks of the river the settlers, horses and cattle dropped, exhausted, side by side with wolves, bears and wildcats, without a thought of any danger except that from the flames. The terror of a common enemy left no thought of anything else.

"At times there were scores of animals smimming across the river. Perhaps never in the history of this country has such a herd of wild animals passed before the eyes o human refugees, but not one them was shot or even molested."
