

THE FRUIT SHOW

named, as they undoubtedly have the right to be? The guiding rule is-where they are no intermediate specimens, it is species where intermediates exist, as they do on the borders where two different localities come into contact, then the forms belonging to each locality are entitled to a third name, that of sab species or variety. Such are our varieties of apples. So that it is not only expected that there will be specimens of any variety, sometimes in the same orchard, re sembling one another, such resemblances must exist. If they do not exist: then they would be full species! Some plants and fruits however, say all, do not display their true characters in the fruit alone. The hardiness and prolifeness of the parent tree may vary immensely, yet the fruit be quite alike. And the question for us is, we as fruit growers have a fruit tree, the only one, produc ing fruit in the poorest of solls in large quantities every year, shall we throw away all that important advantage simply because some person, however learned, in some dis tan' loca: l y has not observed, in fruit grown by him any material difference, are we to throw away our name a d all that name means to us? As soon let an outsider advise or take charge of any other department of your farm or business. The foregoing shows why we need not be concerned with what the man in Nova Scotta, or New York State thinks of the New Brunswick as grown in this section, and let me suggest confidential ly, dont be alarmed too much by what you see printed in a "book." All living natural sciences in a state of progress, we are still learning, with much new to learn, the book of today is superceded by a new one, correct ing the imperfections in the old. For science progress progresses by discarding what is un true. But to point out what are some of the differences between the variety Duchess and the variety New Brunswick, in the greater part of New Brunswick, they are these: the true Duchess as I was able to establish from the growers themselves who exhibited fruit under those names lately at St John, are thesa: The Duchees is a generally somewhat flatter apple, the color of its skin is greeny yellow, while that of the New Brunswick is a rich creamy yellow. The markings or red are a dullish red in Duchess and a brighter

The Dcuhess is a sourer apple, and there were those who maintained down river, that it is never what may be called a good eating ing apple, whereas our New Brunswick in its prime is a very good eating apple. In every case where I could bring the grower to the exhibits-pointed out Duchess and New Brunswick. One finely colored plate in the Duchess group confirmed my expressed opin ion-saying "Yes, you are right, those are really New Brunswicks, they dld not come from Sharps' Nursery but from another nursery in the Province. I had supposed un til now that they were all the same variety."

I hope we may never see again what was seen at the recent Centreville exhibitiontwenty plates, of which the very best speci mens were acknowledged as true New Bruns wick, exhibited as Duchess, because whoever made up the list saw fit not to mention 'New Brunswick ' The beautiful 'Wealthy' apples which took first prize at that show, were not Wealthies but a very bitter, typical bitter sweet, not Wealthy at all, certainly not en titled to prize as typical Wealthy, even if it was what fruit men call a 'sport' out of Wea thy stock. The Wealthy, by the way, was advised by the Dominion horticulturist, as a variety for us to plant, not only on account of its prolificness, and the high prices it commands in England,, but on account of commencing to hear fruit sooner than al most any other apple. And the advice for us up north here is - lant as your standards, far apart, say forty feet, those kinds which do not fruit until they are quite large; plant close in between with varieties which bear young, and when they begin to crowd, take them while yet small and replant them in a new orchard, leaving the large standards.
