EDWIN BAYARD MANZER.

The friends of Edwin Bayard Manzer were shocked to learn of his death, which occurred at his home on Friday morning after a short illness of pneumonia. Mr Manzer had been confined to the house the greater part of the week previous with a cold, but on Sunday he was feeling better and he and Mrs Manzer went for a motor ride with Mr and Mrs Geo. E. Phillips. On returning to the house, however, he was seized with a chill, and later in the evening became unconscious, in which state he continued until his death at 6.45 on Friday morning. He was in the 33 year of his age.

He leaves a wife, who was Miss Jessie Watt, daughter of Mr and Mrs John Watt and four young children, Louise, John, Harold and Donald, also his father B B Manzer and one brother Dr. G. B. Manzer. W. B. Belyea is an uncle. The funeral was held from his home on Sunday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock. The service at the house was conducted by the Rev Geo D Ireland. The beautiful Masonic burial service was conducted at the grave by past Master John Mc Lauchlan. The pall bearers were James A. Gibson, Wallace Gibson, Donald Nicholson, Loggie Ross, Jack Dible and George Smith.

Mr Manzer was a member of Lodge F & A M. In politics he was a conservative. The funeral was one of the largest that has been seen in Woodstock for many years.

REV. JOHN L. SHAW.

Rev John L. Shaw, a retired Baptist minister, died at his residence, 21 Rosefield street, early yesterday morning aged 78 years. Up to five or six weeks ago deceased had been a very active man in home mission work. He was greatly respected by men of all denominations and his work was highly appreciated, being always marked by a spirit of rare self-sacrifice and patience. About twenty-five years ago owing to ill health he was obliged to give up the active work of the ministry and come to this city. He had preached with much acceptance in Carleton, York and Queens counties and since coming here he had supplied quite often at Greenwich, Queens county.

During his long illness his patience never failed and he was ever ready with his sweet sympathy to encourage the deserving of all classes and creeds. He was possessed of more than ordinary ability as a preacher and was widely known as a devout student of the Bible.

Mr Shaw was born in Fredericton of staunch Loyalist stock. He was twice married. His first wife who predeceased him many years ago, was a Miss Boyer, of Victoria Corner, Carleton County. By this marriage, his daughter, Mrs Stokes, of Waterville, Carleton county survives. His second wife survives and he also leaves one daughter, Mrs S H Shaw, of Victoria Corner, Carleton county, is a brother. The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon at 2.30.

LOTTIE ALMA WILSON.

Lottie Alma Wilson, daughter of Mungo Wilson, Lakeville, died at the home of her sister, Mrs Wheeler, Florenceville, Nov 9th., 1910, aged 30 years.

The deceased was an estimable Christian young lady, and bore her lingering illness without a murmur. She is mourned by an aged father and mother, three brothers and six sisters, for whom much sympathy is expressed. The funeral services were held at Florenceville, Nov 10th.

CUDAHY FIRM FOUNDER DEAD.

GRAND FALLS MAN BATTLES WITH BEAR.

In becoming the possessor of a bear skin taken from the largest bear ever shot in Eastern Quebec, Frank Price of Grand Falls had a narrow escape from death while hunting at New Perth, St Perpetue, Que., on Saturday, Nov. 12.

The monster bear had floored Price and seized him by the shoulder when Price's companion, John Cox, a merchant of New Perth, dropped from his position in a tree, and by kicking the bear from behind drew the animals attack to himself, allowing Price to rise to his feet and secure the rifle he had dropped.

While Cox in turn set the pace for Bruin in a foot race, Price shot the animal but not until it had seized Cox by the foot as he was endeavoring to climb a tree.

The two men were on the trail of a deer several miles from camp when they came upon the tracks of a bear, which by their size they knew must have been made by an animal of unusual proportions. The trail led them to a cave in a cliff and as they were considering the next move they were horrified by the sudden appearance of the animal, who rushed upon them with hair on end and foam flying from its mouth.

Cox immediately sought refuge in a tree, but as Price turned to flee his foot slipped and in an instant the monster was upon him. He seized Price by the shoulder and was dragging him in the direction of the cave when Cox slipped down from his perch and kicked the bear heartily in the rear.

Price bore marks of the encounter but was not severely injured.

MRS JOHN McGRATH

The death took place on Sunday, after a brief illness, of Mrs John McGrath, at her late residence, Tapley's Mills, aged 79 years. Deceased, who was a most estimable woman, was born in Oromocto, but was a resident of this county for many years. Her husband died seven years ago. She is survived by two sons and four daughters, Thomas and John at home, Mrs Stillman Hanson of Tapley's Mills, Mr Patrick Montague of Newburg, Mrs Everett Keating of Houlton and Mrs Fred Bowles of Grafton.

The funeral was held on Tuesday morning at nine o'clock, from the home to St Gertrude's church, where a requiem high mass was celebrated by Rev F J McMurray, after which interment was made in the Catholic cemetery.

RESIGNATION OF REV T W STREET TO BE TENDERED.

Rev T W Street, will shortly resign as sub dean of Christ Church Cathedral, and his action will mark the retirement of the oldest living clergyman in the Diocese of Fredericton.

It is learned from an authoritative source that the resignation of Rev Mr Street will be forwarded to the Bishop of Fredericton within a short time, probably next month, but it will not become effective until probably next June.

The reverend gentleman's many friends will learn with deep regret of his retirement and particularly so as he will remove to St. John to reside. He is now approaching four score of years and fifty-six years of the time he has spent in the ministry. Both Rev Mr Street and his wife will be much missed from Fredericton.

Rev Mr Street was born at Woodstock in 1831, and was the oldest of eleven children of the late Rev S D Lee Street, who for forty-one years was rector of that parish. He received his early education in his native town and later entered King's College—now the University of New Brunswick—from which institution he was graduated in 1851. He was ordained by the late Bishop Medley on June 3, 1855, and is the oldest living clergyman in the diocese of Fredericton.

Shortly after his ordination he was sent as curate to St Stephen, and about 1858 he left the diocese and went to Ontario, where he was engaged as a private tutor.

When the Civil War between the Northern and Southern States broke out, he was appointed chaplain in the 80th New York volunteers and went to the front with his regiment. He served in the thickest of the heavy fighting, and was present at the capture of Petersburg and Richmond.

At the conclusion of the war he was appointed to the diocese of Western New York under Bishop Cox. Rev Mr Street returned to the Diocese of New Brunswick in 1894 and was appointed Rector of Bathurst by Bishop Kingdon. In 1902 he came here as Sub-dean of the Cathedral in place of Rev Mr Whalley, and has resided here ever since.

THE BISHOP'S VISITATION.

The Bishop of Fredericton visited Woodstock on Sunday last, and at eleven o'clock services confirmed thirty six candidates.

In his address he called the attention of the candidates to the serious and solemn step they were taking in their lives, and urged them to follow out in their future lives the stand they had now taken. The great aids in their struggle against sin, were prayer, the reading of the holy scriptures and holy communion. He particularly dwelt upon the need of reverence, particularly in church, and of obedience to the rules of the church to which they belong. After the service the bishop had a word to say to each of the candidates. On Monday afternoon Rev Mr Teed drove the bishop to Richmond Corner where he delivered an address to the women's auxiliary. On Monday evening a missionary meeting was held in the Parish Hall in connection with St Luke's Church, when an address, illustrated by lantern slides was given by Rev Mr Cody rector of St James St John, who was for some six years engaged in missionary work in the Yukon. It was a most interesting address and was listened to by a large audience which filled the hall to its utmost capacity.

ST STEPHEN MAN ACCIDENTLY SHOT.

St. Stephen, Nov. 24.—Jeremiah Collins, son of John Collins, of this town, was accidentally shot this afternoon while hunting in the woods at Digdegnash. The gun was accidentally discharged and a bullet entered the upper part of the thigh and passed through the body. He is now in Chipman hospital, and unless blood poisoning sets in, hopes for his recovery are entertained.

ST. CROIX PAPER MILL OUT OF COMMISSION.

St. Stephen, Nov. 27.—The large driving wheel of the St Croix Pulp and Paper Company at Woodland (Me.) burst last night. One piece was driven through and destroyed a paper machine and another machine was partially destroyed. The loss will probably be \$25,000. The mill will be closed for perhaps two weeks. Fortunately there was no loss of life, although there were several narrow escapes.

Swept Overhead.

While crossing the Bay of Fundy on the steamer Yarmouth Sunday morning, Robert Tupper was swept overboard and drowned. He was returning from upper Canada on his honeymoon trip and his young bride witnessed the tragic affair.
