### Current Events

The party politicians are occupied in giving reasons for the Democratic landslide in last week's elections in the United States, but the reason that meet with most acceptance is the failure of the Republican party to revise the tariff downward, as the people confidently expected it to do, which so exasperated the great body of the voters, who were keenly suffering from the increased cost of living, that they turned to the Democrats in despair, hoping that some relief might come from that party in the way of lower duties on imported necessities of life. If they are disappointed again they'll turn to the New Nationalists or even to the Socialists, but genuine reform they will have.

The results of the American Congressional and gubernatorial elections are immensely pleasing to Germany. The Democratic landslide is interpreted as an indication that the protection movement has been definitely checked, and that 1911 will inaugurate an era of lower tariffs, from which Germany and the rest of Europe are bound to derive great profit.

Four women will sit in the Eighteenth General Assembly of Colorado as a result of the recent election. They are Alma Lafferty, Louise U Jones and Louise M Kerwin, all elected to the House of Representatives from Denver districts on the Democratic ticket, and Agnes Riddle, Republican, Representative from Adams, Arapahoe, and Elbert Counties. In the last General Assembly Mrs Lafferty, who has been re-elected, was the only woman Representative. There are no woman Senators.

President Taft is in Panama, where he is inspecting the canal.

Official announcement is made in London that the conference of political party leaders, organized to settle the House of Lords veto question has failed to agree and another general election may take place, and be over before the middle of December, as it is said that dissolution of parliament has been agreed upon by the Cabinet. The public is still in ignorance of the rock upon which the conference came to grief, but it is no secret in the inner circles that had Mr Balfour possessed sufficient influence over his colleagues in former Unionist Cabinets to induce them to go as far as he was willing to go in the matter of proportion the representation of the House of Lords in the proposed joint sessions with the Commons the Conference would not have failed. The House met on Tuesday, but owing to the absence of the Premier, who has been consulting the King, adjourned to Friday, when an announcement will be made. In the House of Lords on Wednesday first reading was given to the Lords veto bill, which may delay dissolution of parliaments.

Sir Alphonse Pelletier, the Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec, has owing to delicate health, been compelled to seek a milder climate for the winter, and is at present at Old Point Comfort, Va.

The Hon W S Fielding, Minister of Finance, upon the advice of his physician, has gone South for a six weeks' rest.

At a farewell entertainment given in Calcutta on Tuesday in honor of Lord Minto the retiring Viceroy and former Governor General of Canada, two young Bengalis were observed pressing close to his Excellency. They with a third, who had attempted to secure admittance on a forged ticket, were arrested.

The Uruguayan rebellion came to an end on Tuesday with the unconditional surrender of the insurgents, who gave up their arms, trusting to the magnanimity of the government in the matter of their punishment.

A reduction of from thirty one to twenty seven days in the mail and passenger service

between Australia and London has been effected by the opening of the new transcontinental railway across the Andes, in the lower part of South America, according to a report received at the State Department at Washington from Frederic W Goding, United States Consul at Montevideo.

As General Botha, the premier, and Johannes Smuts, the attorney general, in the parliament of the Union of South Africa, have both declined titles, further honors in connection with the opening have been postponed.

There has been serious rioting in Shanghai over the sanitary work for the prevention of the spread of the plague. Reports had been spread among the ignorant natives that the health officers were poisoning their fellow countrymen in the hospitals, taking out the eyes of babies by electricity and committing other unheard of cruelties. Attacks were made on the sanitary officers and the riot assumed such proportions that volunteers were called out to restore order. During the fighting several foreigners were seriously injured.

Germany has followed the example of Great Britain, France, Spain and Italy, and last week resumed relations with the Portuguese government. The action of these governments is regarded as a virtual recognition of the republic of Portugal. The United States has not yet formally recognized the new republic.

Premier Briand after the debate following the Ministerial declaration of its policy in the French Chamber of Deputies last week, obtained a vote of confidence, the vote standing 296 to 209. He declined to specify the measures the Government intended to adopt beyond saying that the rights of military requisition would be strengthened and the right to strike would be refused to employees of public services affecting the country's vital interests.

The Tariff Conference between representatives of the Canadian and American governments was concluded at Ottawa last Thursday and will probably resume in January next. The hope is expressed by the commissioners that an arrangement will be reached that will prove acceptable to the people on both sides of the border. It is understood that the land slide in favor of the Democrats in the elections in the United States caused the halt in the negotiations. According to a statement issued by Hon W S Fielding, one of the Canadian commissioners, the whole discussion at the four conferences, which were held was of the most frank and friendly nature.—World Wide.

A reform of the English language is a 'very ing need,' but it is likely to be accomplished by very slow degrees while the adoption of Volapuk or Esperanto as a universal language scientific and easily acquired, does not seem to be within the range of the practical. In more senses than one in fact, 'what we have we hold.' We hold fast, we English speaking people, to a cumbersome, ungainly method of measuring, and weighing, and counting, when we have a more accurate and an easier method at hand, and which is in use in the Latin and in the majority of other countries. Call it conservatism, obstinacy, cultivated ignorance or what you may, the world clings to old forms however inconvenient or absurd they may be when outgrown. There is no doubt, for instance, that the calendar needs readjustment. The days of the month are now so clumsily varied that they need in school to impart this doggerel for the purpose of a guide to them: 'Thirty days hath September, April, June, and November, February hath twenty eight days alone; All the rest have thirty one; Except in leap year that's the time February hath twenty nine.' The rhyme is as awkward as the arrangement of the days of the month it celebrates, and yet it is pretty safe to say that the facts it conveys will be accurate for some long while yet. In spite of the recommendations of the Berne Conference for a more scientific and much more easily remembered arrangement of months and days. At long last, without doubt, a more sensible calendar will be universally accepted and put in practice.—Montreal Witness.

### KILLING BACILLI.

Prof Sims Woodhead reports that the experiments made at Cambridge, England, on the sterilization of water by chlorine and chlorin compounds have given "most startling results." One part of available chlorine to 2,000,000 parts of water sufficed to kill all non spore bearing bacilli, including the typhoid, and probably also the cholera, type, within half an hour, even in the presence of an appreciable amount of organic matter. The unimportant spore bearing bacilli were not killed. An experimental tank containing 80,000 gallons of water was used after the preliminary tests, and equal success was obtained. Those employed in the work drank freely of the water without noting any injurious effects from the chlorine.—The Youth's Companion.

### Oldest Oak Tree in England

(London Telegraph.)

A correspondent telegraphing to Mr Lewis Harcourt, First Commissioner of his Majesty's Office of Works, suggesting that for its proper protection a suitable fence should be placed around the famous old oak tree in Hampton Court Park, has received a reply, in which the right honorable gentleman says: This fine old oak tree, in which you are so good as to take an interest, is especially under the care of the keepers and the staff of the park, who have strict instructions from Mr Harcourt as to its preservation and protection.

The tree, which is situated close to the south side of the Long Water, is reputed to be about 1,000 years of age, and it is probably the oldest oak tree in England. Its gigantic trunk two feet from the ground measures about 45 feet around, and being quite hollow offers standing room for about a dozen persons. The sides, however, are so sturdy as to give support to a number of branches, some of them dead wood but the greater number are still alive, and come into bud every year. Some time ago a quantity of dried grass and paper was placed in the trunk by it is supposed mischievous boys and set alight with the result that the old oak was nearly destroyed.

### A Valuable Discovery

(The 'Academy,' London.)

Time, which discloses much that was hidden has recently brought to light a map which cannot fail to be of interest to all Englishmen and Americans. It also brings out into the light of day another secret of Catharine de' Medici, the great French Queen. The map was only discovered a few weeks ago, in the Bibliothèque Nationale in Paris, and represents, under date of 1584, the New World, both North and South America, as French colonies. The happy discoverer is M Charles de la Ronciere, who explains this forgotten, if ever known, page of history as follows:—

'Two French Viceroy's had been named to occupy and govern the Americans. Of these Troilus de Mesgones, the favorite of the Queen was ordered to retake North America, abandoned since the days of Cartier. In regard to South America, Queen Catharine certainly planned to seize Brazil in the confusion caused by the Portuguese troubles of the time. I think these plans of empire are plainly revealed by three documents which have recently come into our hands. The first is a map of Brazil belonging to our collection and dedicated to Strozzi. Upon it is a mark with this significant explanation on the margin: Here is the best point from which to attack Rio de Janeiro in the rear. The second is a commission as Lieutenant General given by the Queen to Strozzi for the conquest of country which neither the Queen nor the King wish to have named. The third is an autograph letter of Catharine to Strozzi enjoining him to take Brazil after having restored the Azores to Dom Antonio of Portugal.'

History relates that Strozzi started upon his mission, the secret of which is only now revealed, with a fleet of seventy five sail, but was defeated and killed off the Azores. Mesgones was wrecked, and all traces of Queen Catharine's dream of a transatlantic empire would have disappeared but for the tell tale map and other documents, which can now be seen in the archives of the French national library.

### SUBMARINE TELEPHONY.

A novel type of submarine cable has just been laid between Dover and Cape Grisnez to facilitate telephonic communication between England and France. By means of loading coils, inserted at intervals of one mile, the efficiency of the cable has been tripled. The coils reduce the distortion of the current impulses, by which the spoken sounds are rendered indistinct. A similar cable has been employed to traverse the Lake of Constance, but this is its first application in sea and tidal waters. The preliminary experiments have given satisfactory results.—The Youth's Companion.
