Fire in Connells Foundry.

A disastrous fire occurred in Connell Bro's Ltd foundry just after tea time on Monday. It was discovered by the night watchman, Wm Ash, between six and seven o'clock, off the boiler in the engine room. It made rapid headway. Although the firemen were on hand as soon as possible, they had a difficult time in getting it under way and all their efforts could not prevent very large damage. The flames soon got into the machine shop, the main building, where it was especially difficult to handle when it got between the metal roof and the wooden lining. A large number of patterns were damaged, which means a serious loss to the company. The wood-working department was damaged by fire and water, and the stove fitting department suffered also badly. Altogether the establishment was severely damaged, and the loss is heavy. Fortunately there is a pretty heavy insurance. The main building was erected as far back as 1870, and this is the first serious fire. Everyone will be very sorry to hear of the loss sustained, for this is one of the manufactories that has been going continuously ever since its inception and has done a large business giving employment to from thirty to forty men right along. It is hoped that after the loss is estimated, it will not be found as great as at first supposed and that the insurance will put the company in a position to make up to a considerable extent for the damage.
