### Provincial Legislature.

The debate on the address was continued by Mr. Labllois who regretted nothing in the speech was acceptable to the farmers, not enough money was voted for agricultural societies and the more societies formed the less each one got. He praised the late Government policy regarding illustration orchards and said this policy laid the foundation for the appointment by the present Government for a special Horticulturist. He wanted regulations restricting four days a week in regard to the running of automobiles. The Government lacked in colonization said the same was keeping young men from coming into the Province. The Highway act was unpopular and control of the roads should have been left with the municipalities. The present Government had been in office only two years and already public opinion had condemned them, what had happened in St. John, Carleton and Northumberland would happen all over the Province at the first opportunity. Mr. Tweeddale said the Government horse importations were of no benefit to New Brunswick, the farmers were forced to compete with out-siders and pay larger prices than otherwise, the loss on re-sale of horses bought by Woodstock Society showed this. He scouted Mr. Fleming's idea that the Government had opened up Cuban markets for potato shippers. Latter had got all the facilities they possessed for themselves before the Government stepped in, the Government should devote attention to establishment of more industries and find employment for men leaving the province for want of it. The Grand Falls water power scheme was an instance where nothing had been done to develop an industry which would bring us enormous benefits. He condemned the Government's crown land policy and said they were favouring their friends at expense of political opponents. The school book policy was a white elephant and the liberal party put no faith in it. Too liberal terms had been given Drummond company for too long period in regard to development of Gloucester Iron Mines. He was surprised to learn that some districts wanted more Road taxes than they already had. In Victoria county, money was spent honestly and was sufficient. As to Valley Railway, said premier had done right in trying to procure Road when in opposition and regretted that Transcontinental had not been built that way. Misrepresentation of Carvell was discreditabale, and credit was due Pugsley for efforts he had made for road. Tweeddale had floor at adjournment.
