Woodstock Circuit Races.

A large crowd gathered at the Woodstock park on Friday afternoon to witness the races. Conditions were excellent for fast time, and the horses surprised even the make optimistic followers of the track.

The Martime provincial record of 2.15 3-4 for pacing stallions was broken three times in the first of the races by Frank Patch, owned by James Adams, of Halifax. The brown stallion won his race in the 2 18 class in straight heats. In both the first and second heats he lowered the record to 2.15 1-4 and won the third heat in the record time of 2.14 1-4. In spite of perfect racing conditions a small crowd was in attendance. The racing was excellent, however, the fast track a warm run, clear sky and scarcely any breeze, made the day a pleasant one.

Helen Taft, a local bred mare owned and driven by George Phair, of Lunenburg, Me., won the 2.35 class in straight heats, the fastest time being 2.20 1-4. Bessie Pardner owned by Baxter and Allen, of Fredericton was second. Peter Pan owned by J A Dewitt, of Presque Isle was third and Look Again owned by J H Thompson, of Woodstock was fourth.

It was in the 2.18 class, however, the keenest interest was shown. A protest by Thomas Holmes, the driver of Helen Gould, that Acker, the driver of Peacherina, had fouled him served to increase the excitement. Holmes declared after the judges had cautioned Acker that the heat in question would undoubtedly have been stopped at least a second faster.

Thomas J. owned by T J Boyer of Woodstock, and Helen Gould, owned by C W Dugan of Woodstock, were popular with the crowd. They raced beautifully and in the final heat were so close to Frank Patch that a blanket would seem to have covered the three horses.

Frank Patch a Winner

Frank Patch, by Patchen Boy, who carried the honors of the day is a five year old stallion. He was bought by Mr Adams in February of last year from the Maywood stock farm, of Indianapolis, Ind. His winning today constitutes his third start and victory this season. In two seasons he has won five out of seven races in which he has started.

James Adams, the owner, declared that in Fredericton last season he was offered \$3000 for the horse to go on the Grand Circuit but turned the proposition down.

Town Council

The town council met on Friday evening. The matter of taking over the G A White property on Connell street was discussed. Ald Watson was appointed to see Mr White and make arrangements to take over the property.

It was stipulated by Mr White that a fence be erected between the dump and at a reasonable distance from the road.

Ald Ketchum said in view of the strong public sentiment manifested in regard to the moving pictures and their effect upon the studies of the school children, this council must take some action. It was a delicate matter to handle. The moving pictures had become a great institution and if properly conducted would be a benefit to the children. He could not understand why the parents had so little authority over the children. They are allowed to go where they liked and do what they liked. He moved a resolution "that no licence be granted to proprietors or persons in charge of the moving picture shows unless they agree not to admit children under 15 years of age, to the evening performances, unless accompanied by their parents or a guardian, or have a permit from their parents or guardian."

Ald Watson thought the resolution should apply to all shows. He had attended the moving picture shows and he did not see anything objectionable.

The motion was carried.

Ald Ketchum complained of the rapid driving of automobiles in our streets, and thought some step should be taken to remedy the evil. There were little children playing on the streets and they should be protected. Ald Hagerman spoke of two autos racing down Main street on Friday at a speed of 25 or 30 miles an hour. He thought the town marshal should enforce the bye-law relating to the speed of these machines.

Wm. Balmain was appointed a pound keeper for the section of the town in which he resides.

Ald Allingham gave notice of motion to pass a bye-law prohibiting persons from driving over and breaking our asphalt sidewalks.
