Death of L. R. McLaren.

One day last week L. R. McLiren, of St. John, traveller for the Canadian Drug Compiny, and Angus Mirtin, of Murray River, were drowned in the Murry river, about half a mile from the fvillage of the tsams; name McLiren, accompanied by Martin, driver of he team, left Murray Harbor North at ten o'clock to drive on the ice to Murray River That was the last seen or heard of them till ten o'clock this morning, when some one noticed the horse's head in a hole in the middle of the river, the empty sleigh attached to the dead body. The men's caps and Mc-Laren's valise were found on the spot and later Martin, s body was recovered by grappling, but McLaren's body is not yet found. The accident occurred only a short distanc. from the shore but in mid-channel, where there is considerable dept of water. Martin was past middle age, married, with a grownup family. This is the second double drowning accident in three weeks, the others being Mrs. McIntyre and a hired man, Plaisted, in Charlottetown harbor.

Mr. McLaren belongs to Moncton, and is a married man about 45 years of age. He enjoyed the good will of all who knew him and the news of his death will be heard with sincere regret. He is survived by a widow and four children. One brother, Charles McLaren, of the I. C R. electrical department; one sister, Mrs. A. E. Leslie, of Moncton, also survive. His wife is a daughter of the late C. D. Thompson, once I. C. R. cashier.

The late Mr. Laren was well known in Woodstock where he was employed for several years in the drug store of H. Paxton Baird. As the representative of the Canadian Drug Co., he had been in town several times lately.

For Cleaning Wall Paper.

Where the paper is smoked, or otherwise soiled, but still in good condition, this is recommended by The Commoner for cleaning: Take one quart of flour, one heaping call spoonful of salt, one tablespoonful of cooking soda, three tablespoonfuls of common household ammonia, and one pint of rainwater. Mx w li and steam for half an hour, in a greased pan; then cut into pieces to handle while still hot and knead thoroug ly as you would dough nntil perfectly smooth; keep in an air tight jar until ready to use; make only as wanted, and rub the paper with the dough, finishing one space before beginning another.
