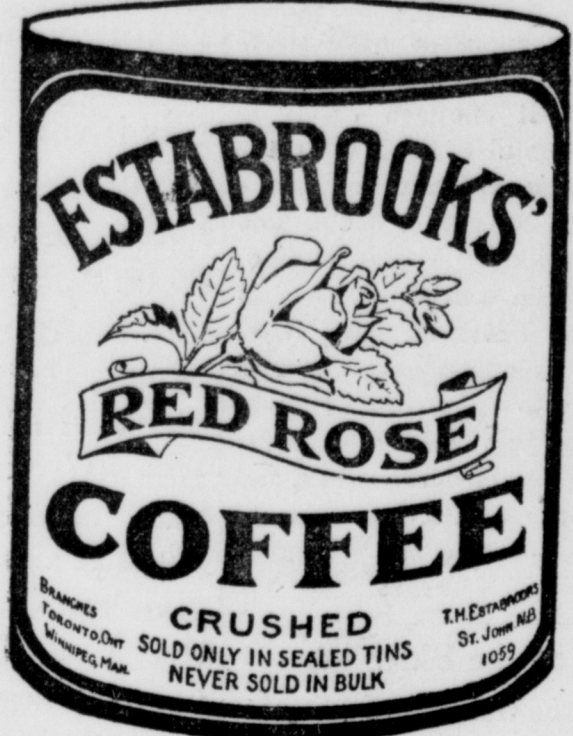

St John Fair's British Features.

Patriotic Items on the Great Programme of Specialties.

Several important features at the Dominion Exhibition, to be held in St John, N B, Sept 5th to 15th next, will stir the loyalty of visitors to a high pitch. The visit of the Royal Canadian Dragoons from Quebec will be an innovation truly; and in the Musical Ride which these military equestrians execute with such wonderful spirit and grace, a series of rhythmic evolutions will astonish watchers. These manoeuvres will be gone through with to the music of massed bands, and during the two engagements of the Royal Dragoons at the Toronto Exhibition tens of thousands of spectators cheered them to the echo. British brass bands belonging to St John regiments and other Maritime Provincial militia will give continuous concerts in various sections of the grounds and buildings, and in the fireworks programme each night a Battle of Dreadnoughts (British versus German) will be shown. These features in themselves, which are only a small section of an enormous programme, will give Union Jack lovers lots to cheer over.

OBITUARY.

It is with sadness that we record the death of our beloved sister Hepsy Burpee wife of Brother Judson Burpee of Upper Woodstock, who was called from her earthly labors to the inheritance beyond on Wednesday morning July 27th, at the age of 72 years.

Sister Burpee was converted some 55 years ago under the labors of Elder Pennington and united with the Baptist Church at Jacksontown. C Carey of Bristol has the contract for painting the U B church here and has already begun the work.

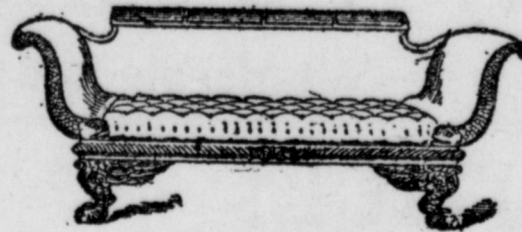
Mr and Mrs Garrity of Lowell, Mass, are visiting relatives and friends here.

MILLION DOLLAR BRIDGE TO CONNECT EDMONTON AND STRATHCONA.

Winnipeg, Aug. 1.—(Special)—The contract for the substructure of the big \$1,000,000,000 high level bridge over the Saskatchewan, connecting Edmonton and Strathcona, was let by contract this afternoon to John Gunn and Sons, of Winnipeg.

The C. P. R. has charge of the building of the bridge, which will carry traffic trains and street cars, a considerable part of the cost being defrayed by grants from both cities, from the Dominion government and Alberta government,
