

COLONIAL CAKE.

An old Colonial recipe for yellow loaf cake calls for one cupful of butter, two and a half cupsful of granulated sugar, six eggs, a cupful of thin cream or rich milk, one even teaspoonful of soda, two of cream of tartar, four cupfuls of pastry flour and one cupful of seeded raisins. Cream the butter and sugar, then stir in the yolks of the eggs. Add the cream of tartar to the flour and sift them together several times. Add the soda to the milk and stir the mixture into the butter, sugar and volks. Then beat the whole into the flour and cream of tartar. When smooth add the raisins, and finally fold the whites of the eggs, whipped to a very stiff froth, through the batter. Do not stir the cake after the whites are added. Butter a tube pan and fill it half full. After it has baked and become cold, ice it with a heavy snow white icing that will contrast prettily with the yellow of the cake. Fredericton Business College in n w Quarters Sept 1st

As a result of the ex cosive improvements being made to the Inches building at the corner of York and Queen Streets, the Frederict in Business Cullege at present licated in the Pitts Bock on York Street, will have quarters second to none in the Maritime Provinces, and surpassed by tone in Canada. The school wil incidently be located once more in the harding in which it was first organized in 1894. Since that time it has been located in the Golden Fleece building and the Pitts Block.

The new quarters of the Business College will be on the third boor of the Inches Block. The situation itself could hardly be bettered, the windows giving an excellent view of Queen Street, Phoenix Square, the grounds of the Provinci d Normal School and the river. The new quarters are to be occupied by Sept 1st.

MAGNIFICENT QUARTERS

The third floor of the Inches building i, being entirely remodelled. When the atterations are completed there wi'l be several large and commodious class rooms, d ided from one another by glass partitions. There will also be a separate office for the principal Mc W J O borne, located at the right of the main stairway. The toilet rooms will be in the ext asion of the Inches block which faces York Stree'. Another storey is being added to this part of the building, and doors cut through the rear walls of the lat er to make the necessary connection between the two.

MODERN IMPROVEMENTS

Hardwood floors are to be laid throughout all that prrt of the building which is to be occupied by the business Coll ge. Steel ceilings are also to be used. The walls of the college premises will be finished in bur-

VENTILATION AND HEATING

Particular attention has been devoted to the heating and ventilation of the new pren. ises, both being particularly important in connection w th schools or similar establishmeats. The ventilation of the new premises will be by two chimneys which are to be used no longer as chimneys. Summer and winter ventilators are to be installed. The Busines College will have its own heating apparatus. A combined hot water and hot air sy: t.m is to be used and it is calculated to keep the temperature comfortable at all times. Electric lights are to be inst.lled throughout the rooms.



Outside exhibitors are contracting with St John people for the erection of their booths, a small army of men are rushing the new buildings to complition, and these will be followed by another detachment of workers who will put the finishing touches on the whole plant.

Remedies For Tan

There are several rimple remedies, seme of which su t one skin, some another. Lemon juice is a harmless bleach, either clear cr mixed with resewater or glycerine, according as it suits your skin. Dab it on after washing your face! t night, and let it dry or. Some persons find cucumber juice satisfactory, when the cucumbers are in season. The sim; le old farhioned remedy of sour butte mik is about as good as any. A chemical blesch peroxide of hydrogen, is efficacious and may be mixed with rosewater if itirribates the skie. Do not let it come in contact with the hair. It should be borne in mind that when a bleach is used too frequently, the skin is apt to become tender and more inclined to sunburn. Do not apply any bleach during the day, before going outof doors. It is wise to protect the face by a shade hat, and then only use the bleach to prevent the coat of tan becoming 'skin deep. A little healthy tan is admired in these days of outdoor life.
