Continued from page three.

Coun. Bell moved, seconded by Coun. Shaw, that \$152.16 be assessed on the parish of Wakefield for road damages. Carried.

Coun. Shaw (Simonds) moved that \$163.38 be assessed parish Simonds for road damages. Coun. Perry seconded the motion. Carried.

Coun. Phillips moved that this council petition the local government to pass legislation prohibiting the running of automobiles on the highways for two days in the week.

Coun. Smith seconded the motion.

Coun. Phillips—I think automobiles are in many respects a public nuisance and they are no means of wealth to the country. It is an injustice for farmers to be driven off the roads by automobiles. It is practically out of the question for farmer's wives and daughters to drive on the roads in summer. If two days in the weeks were allowed them that would be something. No injustice would be done to the owners of automobiles while as at present great injustice is done to the farmers and particularly to their wives and daughters. The farmers keep up the roads and they are the people who do not own automobiles.

Coun. Balmain—I have heard it said that the auto has come to stay, and there is something, no doubt, also in the statement that they are a menace, but the fear of the auto is more in the driver's head than in the horse's head. Last year I met a dozen teams in a drive of 40 miles and in one case only was the horse afraid. In all places where there is progress these things are coming in and are coming to stay. I would not like a motion as this to pass.

Coun. Williams—I am a good deal of the opinion of the last speaker. I have found that in many cases horses are not afraid of the autos.

Coun. Lamont—I am something like the last two speakers, although I was against the autos when the matter came up last summer. Certain restrictions should be and are placed on autos. If the autos would be compelled to slow down when they met teams, it would be a great help out of the difficulty.

Coun. King—The great trouble about automobiles is in running them after dark. He spoke of a case of a Woodstock man who drove at a reckless speed one night last summer and nearly broke up him and his carriage up.

Coun. Melville said the only explanation now was that Coun. Phillips must be a very poor teamster—that was after listening to the speakers who had just spoken.

Coun. Phillips thought the auto owners should be satisfied with five days in the week.

Coun. Gibson thought the people who keep up the roads should not be kept off the roads by automobiles. He had six horses. Only one was not afraid of an auto.

Coun. Perry thought that some of Coun. Phillips' lady friends must be unduly nervous. Suppose a man got away from home on one of those days. The reckless driving should be stopped, but autos have certainly come to stay.

Motion was lost.

Coun. Keenan moved that \$39.00 be assessed on Kent. \$25.00 paid Mrs. Frances McGuire for road damage and \$9.00 to Peter Feeney for Jury. Carried.

The Sec-treas said the auditor and he had quite a difficulty as to the ending of the year, and it would be a convenience to them if the time of meeting was changed from the second to the third Tuesday in January. He made this as a suggestion. It would give them more time to make up the accounts and audit.

Coun. Williams said that it used to be on the third Tuesday. It was changed to the second Tuesday to avoid as many snow storms as possible, but this did not apply now so strongly as it did and he moved that the by-law be changed so as to make the meeting on the 3rd instead of 2nd Tuesday. Seconded and carried.

Coun. Lamont, seconded by Coun. Hemphill, moved that the rate of assessment be changed from 20 to 25 cents for Aberdeen. Carried.

Coun. Lamont moved that \$50.00 be assessed and charged to Aberdeen to be paid to the Highway Board.

Coun. Hemphill seconded the motion. Carried.

Council then adjourned sine die.
