Peel six ripe tomatoes, cut in halves and press out the seeds. Then chop the tomato fine and lay on a sieve to drain as dry as possible. Add half a teaspoonful salt, two dashes of pepper, a teaspoonful of onion juice, a dash of paprika and about half a cup of good, thick, sweet cream, whipped to a stiff froth. Fold the cream in carefully and add it at the last minute before serving.

His Excellency the Governor-General, having concluded his voyage through Hudson Bay and Strait, is said to be contemplating a tour of the West Indies this coming winter.—World Wide.

There is a bitter complaint in Germany owing to the scarcity of meat and the high prices due to the tariff. Meetings are being held in many places at which resolutions are adopted for treating the Government to open up the frontiers for the admission of cattle, whether dead or alive, in order to relieve the famine. The demand made at these meetings include the admission of American canned meats. President Kempf of the Berlin Merchants Guild has given notice of his resolution asking the City Council to petition the Government on the subject.—World Wide.

For the first time in hundreds of years the investiture of the Prince of Wales will take place in Wales. After a keen competition between Cardiff and Carnarvon for the honor the King has decided in favor of Carnarvon. The ceremony will occur in July, 1911.—World Wide.

During the five months ending the 21st of August, the current fiscal year, the revenue of the Dominion of Canada increased \$7,330,000 over the receipts for the corresponding period of 1909, being \$45,830,370, as against \$38,500,160. Expenditure on ordinary account was \$27,546,017, an increase of \$1,190,838, and upon capital account \$1,161,450 a comparative decrease of \$1,270,135, for August. Canada owes today in London \$260,240,237, which is seven millions less than on the same date in 1909, when the Government had temporary loans amount to the amount of \$7,300,000, which have been converted.—World Wide.

CREAM NUT LOAF.

This is a very good substitute for meat and it may be served sliced cold with cold tomato sauce or tomato jelly; Grind or chop fine one cup of English walnuts, one cup of cream or rich milk, two eggs beat in light, two tablespoonfuls of grated onion and a cup of rolled dried bread crumbs mixed with four tablespoonfuls of soft butter. Season to taste with salt, pepper and celery salt. Bake in moderate oven for half an hour or until it is firm in the centre.

AN APPETIZER.

Take one large onion or several small ones, and two fresh cucumbers, chopped fine; three large tomatoes—chop and squeeze all the juice out; three chopped green peppers—take seeds out of all but one; one half teaspoonful of salt and one of sugar, and a little black pepper. Mix well together and cover with vinegar. It is ready for use immediately, and is good with cold meat.

Fourth Of July Injuries.—Statistics collected by the "Journal of the American Medical Association" show that 2,923 persons were injured in Fourth of July celebrations this year, of whom 131 died. Large as this total is, it is much the smallest in any of the eight years covered by the association's figures. In 1903, the first year when statistics were collected, there were 4,449 persons injured, of whom 466 lost their lives—406 of them from tetanus (lockjaw). The decrease in the number of accidents this year is attributed to the efforts to promote a "safe Fourth" by restrictive state legislation and city ordinances and the force of public opinion. Massachusetts, where a law was passed regulating the use of explosives, had only one-seventh as many injuries this year as last.—The Youth's companion.

Preparatory operations have begun for the raising of the United States battleship "Maine," sunk in Havana harbor by an explosion just prior to the outbreak of war with Spain, it is hoped that the mystery connected with her loss will be solved when she is raised.—World Wide.

Ever since Paris was visited by the great floods of last winter, which did damage to such an enormous extent, the engineers have been devising methods to prevent a recurrence. At last, it is announced, their efforts have been crowned with success, and it is believed that the problem of coping with the situation has been solved. It is intended to sink a large number of shafts along the front of the River Marine so that in the event of the river rising beyond its banks the surplus of water shall be carried off by these shafts. In that way the river would not rise as rapidly as it can now. At the same time the Seine would be kept at a normal height and there would be no possible chance, it is believed, for a flood.

The Eucharistic Congress in Montreal brought thousands of visitors to the city from many places in Canada and the United States to take part in the pageant. On Friday morning a throng of 75,000 people assembled on Fletcher's Field for the first open-air ceremony of the Congress. Archbishop Farley of New York, drove to the place of assembly with Archbishop Bruchesi. On his arrival, Archbishop Farley was escorted to the temporary altar at the foot of Mount Royal, from which he said mass. The preacher of the day was Monsignor O'Connell, archbishop of Boston. When the Papal Legate, Cardinal Vannutelli, arrived at the mountain, escorted by a mounted squad of Hibernians, a set of chimps which had been placed on the mount rang out a welcome. On Sunday the carrying of the Host followed by an enormous procession, numbering a hundred thousand persons, again went to Fletcher's Field, where from the altar, the Sacramental benediction was pronounced by the Legate, which concluded the ceremonies. The next Congress will be held in Seville, Spain.—Wide World.

NEW FIRE PROOF CONSTRUCTION

A new method of fire proof construction for small buildings has been invented in response to the growing demand. Steel tubing filled with concrete is used for the frame, and a network of wire for the basis of walls, floors and roof. On this skeleton a concrete house of such strength can be built that, it is claimed, it will be practically earthquake proof. Six inch pipe, steel wire and expanded metal, malleable iron fittings and cement are the materials used. The wires are strung to a tension of 1,000 pounds, and bind the whole together with enormous solidity. On them the concrete is spread three inches thick in spans not exceeding 16 feet. Construction is so simple that unskilled labor can be largely used.—The Youth's Companion.
