

Death of G F Plummer

The community was shocked on Saturday list to hear of the sudden and tragic death of George Frederick Plummer. He had been on a short visit to Fort Fai field and had just left the home of his son-in low to return to his home in Upper Woodstock. When he had been a short distance on his way he missed some papers out of his wagon and returned to recover them. He was crossing the railway track at a sharp curve when the engine struck him. He was carried about ten rods and badly mullited. The remains were brought to Woolstock on Saturday and taken to his home at Upper Woodstock. The funeral took place on Sunday and was largely attended. The Rev Messrs Ayers, Phillips and Copeland efficiated. The pali bearers were A E Plummer, Amasa Plummer, Charles Plummer and Fred Fester.

Deceased was born in Watervill, NB, about 67 years ago, and was one of the best known men in this section of the province. About ten years ago he sold his farm at Waterville and bought a farm in Fort Fairfield, and in a few years became practic ly independent through his success in raising potitions.
