Town Council.

Council met at 8 o'clock on Friday evening. Present, Mayor Jones and a full board.

Moved by Ald. McManus and Watson that the town council give a grant of \$200 to the Band under the same conditions as last year.

Moved in amendment by Ald. Allingham and Fisher that the band be paid \$250, that it payed pro rata, that the concerts be in charge of a committee of the council, that the concerts commence at 8 o'clock and that at least eight selections must be given each evening.

Amendment lost. Motion carried. Moved by Ald. Allingham and Watson and passed that the street committee ask for tenders to place a concrete retaining wall under building in King street, the proprietors to pay one half the cost.

Ald. Allingham would not recommend building a sidewalk on Cedar street. Neither would Ald. Hagerman recommend placing another light on that street.

A letter was read from C. D. Jordan J. P., in the matter of a bill from A. F. Fawcett. Referred to street committee for settlement. Voted that a sewer be placed on Gold street at a cost of \$196; on Regent street at a cost of \$98, and 150 feet on Main street at a cost of \$74.88, the total amount to be expended in the neighborhood of \$362.

On request of Ald. Ketchum, Ald. Watson postponed his motion to rescind the beer license law until next meeting.

Tenders for painting the Town Hall were received as follows: Charles Donnelly \$61.75; A. W. Fields \$65, and John Sanderson \$120.

Moved by Ald. Watson and Allingham and passed that the tender of A. W. Fields be accepted.

H. D. Stevens, auditor, reported, filled and an order drawn on treasurer for \$30 for services.

All bills and salaries due were ordered paid.

Voted that an electric light be placed on the Houlton Road.

Voted that the fire committee purchase 200 feet of hose.

Moved by Ald. Hagerman, seconded by Ale. Fisher, that Supt. Fields be instructed to get metal numbers for each electric light pole, and that all salaried officials and aldermen report the number of the lights not burning. Withdrawn.

Moved by Ald. McManus and Watson and passed, that C. D. Johnston, manager of the Power Co., be informed that complaints against certain lights have been made to the board, and in future, the usual amount will be deducted on lights not burning. Council then adjourned.
