### Town Council.

At the meeting of the Town Council held on Friday evening last, the report of the Town Treasurer for the month of September, showed that \$8,145.97 had been expended and \$1188.44 received. The debit balance at the bank was \$1540.39. During the month the balance of the appropriation for schools, \$5,000, making \$10,000 in all had been paid, also the balance due the county, and the annual payment to sinking fund. During the year up to the end of September \$31,095.11, had been received and \$31,988.58 disbursed. There is still a large proportion of the taxes for 1910 unpaid, and a resolution was passed ordering the treasurer to notify all delinquent tax payers that after the first of November stringent measures will be taken to collect the balance. A resolution was passed instructing the Finance Committee to pay a bond for \$1000 that matures on the 25th inst.

Upon motion the Mayor and councillors were appointed delegates to the meeting of the Union of Municipalities which will meet in Woodstock on the 19th and 20th inst.

### Water Too Low For Fall Drives.

The only thing that will make a fall-drive possible on the St John River is heavy rain which will continue for some time. There is little hope for that now, but contractor John S Scott who was in charge of the Corporation Drive this year is ready to make the attempt to bring more logs out if there is the least chance.

At present 15,000,000 feet is hung up on the upper river. Part of this is in the neighborhood of Elmuiston and part is at Grand Isle. At present the intention is to put on large crews of men and bring the logs out to the St John Lumber Company's booms and sort them there. The logs of that company will be retained and the others driven to Van Buren with the intention of hanging them up for the winter.

The mills in and about St John are expected to stop sawing shortly, the scarcity of logs being the cause. It is thought that the logs now hung up will come out safely next spring.

### Mr James McFrederick

### Mrs J B Roxborough.

Our community was somewhat shocked and many were saddened, last Wednesday, when the sad intelligence came over the wire, that Mrs J B Roxborough of Banford, Me, had died suddenly at her home. During her lifetime she passed many days as an invalid; but through it all she had always looked above to the All Wise Father, and could say with Christian courage and hope "Thy will be done." Mrs Roxborough was formerly Miss Lottie Carvell of Carvell, N B, and had many relatives and friends at that place, as well as in other adjacent villages, who will mourn their loss and revere her memory.
