China's Lost Classics.

(Harper's Weekly.)

When in 1900, during the Boxer troubles, fires devastated a large portion of the city of Peking, there were lost to the world certain Chinese classics held by scholars to be of great interest to students everywhere.

The Han Lin College, an institution so ancient that even tradition has preserved no account of its origin, was completely destroyed, and with it the immense store of books that had been collected through many centuries.

Many of these were in manuscript, and others were rare old copies of the very earliest printed books. There was also an immense library of modern volumes and in many instances the wooden blocks from which these were printed had been preserved along with the books themselves. Hardly a single one escaped the fire.

Particularly unfortunate was the loss of the only remaining copy of a monumental work that the Chinese call the "Yang Lo-Ta-Ten," or the "Veritable Records." This extraordinary compilation makes all our modern encyclopedias appear insignificant in size. It was prepared by order of an Emperor of the Ming dynasty in the early years of the fifteenth century, and 2,169 scholars are said to have been employed upon the task. The "Veritable Records" included everything of value which had ever been written in Chinese up to the time of its completion, in the fields of history, philosophy, general literature, science, religion, medicine, art or the handicrafts.

The work was divided into 22,877 sections and bound in 11,100 volumes, which, all together, contained 917,480 pages.

More than a century after the original work had been completed two copies of it were made. The original and one of the copies were destroyed at the downfall of the Ming dynasty in 1644, and in 1900 the copy preserved in the Han Lin College met the same fate.

Five volumes only were saved from the flames and these are now in possession of the University of Cambridge. It is possible, however, that these five slender volumes will be of more service and interest to the world at large than the complete work ever was, for so jealous were the Chinese scholars of their venerated relic, that no foreigner was ever allowed so much as to look upon it.

What Gives Roosevelt His Hold?

What is it that gives Roosevelt his grip on the people of the United States? That the Ex-President has a grip on a large portion of the American people is evident from the reception given him on his return from Africa from his recent triumphal tour half way across the continent, and still more by his spectacular feat in overturning the entrenched bosses of the Republican party in New York State in a pitched battle at the Saratoga Convention.

All these personal triumphs have been achieved in the face of a showing up that would have wholly destroyed any ordinary politician. Not only has Roosevelt's glaring inconsistency been established, but even his veracity has been called into question. Everything which he has denounced Bryan for advocating in the past—with the possible exception of the Nebraskan's silver policy—he is now advocating himself. He denounced Bryan so recently as two years ago, for urging publicity in campaign contributions before elections, he is now vociferously calling for the adoption of the same policy himself. He sided with Bryan and the Democrats in the past when the latter ventured, in the most moderate language, to criticize the judgments of the Supreme Court of the United States; in his recent tour, in an address before the Colorado Legislature, he specifically condemned two of the judgments

of that same Court. He condemns corporations for interference in politics, and at the same time, according to The New York Post, he accepted special train services from the Pennsylvania road to the extent of \$100,000 while President, without paying for the same. It is even charged that he accepted the service of a special train to Cleveland for the purpose of attending the wedding of a daughter of the late Senator Hanna. Finally his action in refusing to sit at meat with Senator Lorimer, because of the latter's connection with a bribery scandal, is contrasted with his action, while President, in inviting the then Mayor of San Francisco to lunch at the White House at a time when this officer was under a charge, afterwards proved, of gross malfeasance in office.

What is it, then, that enables the only living Ex-President to retain such a strong hold on the American people? A writer in The Public of Chicago says it is not so much what he says or does as his way of saying and doing. Every gesture is given with a nap; every word fizzles with the electric force behind it, while the square face and powerful neck seem to fit in with word and action.

This writer seems to have come nearest the explanation of the peculiar phenomena presented. Behind all this is the fact that Roosevelt in many ways typifies the American character as it has never before been typified in any one prominent individual. He embodies the restless activity, the untiring personal energy and unshaken optimism of the masses. He does all this at a time when the high cost of living, and alarm over the danger to democratic institutions involved in the growth and greed of corporate wealth, has stirred the American people as they had not been stirred before since the Civil War, and he voices the discontent, the fears and the hates of the voiceless multitude. The masses do not stop to think of present inconsistency with past record; they are not thinking of the past at all. They think only of the present, and acclaim the man who gives voice to the grievances they feel now and does it in a way typically American.

It can scarcely be possible, however, that the influence will be lasting or the leadership permanent. The writer in The Public seems to be justified in saying that the appeal is to the mob which admires bold to do in outline, that is moved by instinct rather than reason, and that the hold on thinking men is not strong. It scarcely seems possible that the fizz can continue fizzing until the next Presidential election, that is still rather more than two years away. The Toronto Weekly Sun.
