Will Accept Award.

THE HAGUE, Sept 12.—Representatives of Great Britain and the United States in the fisheries award have decided to accept the result without question. Each country had made reservation that the demand for a revision of the award of the tribunal could be made within five days after the promulgation. Both countries have decided not to question the finding of the court and to accept the award in all its details as binding on each government. Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, Chief Justice of Canada, who was the British representative on the tribunal, left for home on Friday.—St John Globe.
