

The Hague Decision.

As the questions tried before Tribunal between the Uri ed U ited Kingdom were til d suit, it is not, perhaps, in the for one side to set up a claim of victory over the other. The decisions made will put to sleep some ma ters which have given a great deal of troubl; and while it is not clear that every hurtful disputed point is settled for a. l time, t is certain that many are. On the whole the decision appears to disallow much that Newfoundland claimed; for it is se t'ed that the Americans may employ on their fishing vessles foreigners, which means that hey can hire Newfoundlanders to fish for them, a point against which the dominant party in Newfoundland has heretofore vigorously fought. So also the American fishing vessels can, apparently trade in the disputed waters, which Newfoundland wildislike very much. The British side, on the other hand, gains by the sett'ement of the headland question as regards bays. The d soussion on this point is along the line-though not complete. y so - of the view so long maintained by Great Britain, and makes the three mile imit of sovereignty from headland to headland. This does not apply to the Bay of Fundy and one or two other places whose status has been previously settled. But the waters to which the decision applies are defined. On the whole the decision of the tribuns I w li be set sfactory to the British nation, as it settles long d sputed matters in which the United Kingdom as such is not deeply i tarested. The pullic opinion of the Dominion of Canada will be gratified by the points favorably decided for England; and as there is not a very large number of Canadian fishing vessels i terested-except, perhaps, from Nova Scitia-any reasonable settlement may be regarded satisfactorily. Newfoundland wil not be content over the whole mater. Her contactions represent the extreme British position-a position larg ly taken through her insistence-and Britain could not win on all the points. Prethat etries are coming in in good shape, sumably, arb to ton cases are prepared; in uch a manner as to allow some lee way to both sides. - St John Globe.
