Fashion Predictions For the Spring.

A modification of the Moyen age dress, charming for house wear, shows the long waist, cut at the neck in a very slight "V" and closing at the left side, just as the pajama coat does.

A broad turnback collar of silk in a contrasting color finishes the neck.

A braided collar may be substituted with good results if preferred to the silk.

A deep flounce meets the long waist just above the knees.

The outer seam is slashed upward and edged with the collar material.

Little lace frills sewn all around the lower edge and slashings are the finish.

TO BE MADE OF FLANNEL

A pretty new shirtwaist model suitable for development in fine French flannel displays three double box plaits down the front, one in the centre and one down each shoulder.

The box plaits are formed by side tucking the material in opposite directions.

Between the box plaits the entire front is laid in half-inch tucks going around the body.

This will be found a generally becoming model. The plaits could be ornamented with buttons to yoke depth if desired.

The sleeves could be in one seam small bishop, confined by cuffs, arranged to correspond with the double box plait.

WARM SHIRTWAISTS.

The dotted challis waist is very light in weight and very warm. Indeed it is well worth a second thought.

Daughters are not very warmly clad these days, and it might be well to take some time for the consideration of the fairly warm winter waist, and should be made with the idea of an occasional bath in warm soapy water.

Almost all challis will stand this treatment occasionally.

On some woolen shirtwaists a single line of embroidered polka dots only appears down each side of the centre box plait and on the cuffs. They are large, the size of a pea and are worked in a quite dark shade of the color shown in the material.

A Matter of \$20,000.

Judgment has been handed down by Judge Johnson in the case of Pommeranke vs. Coy, Bate and Murison giving a decision in favor of the plaintiff Pommeranke with costs. The amount of the judgment will be about \$20,000, being the difference between \$25 an acre and \$125 an acre on 226 acres of land.

Pommeranke placed the land for sale with W. P. Bate who in turn entered into a secret agreement with W. H. Coy and W. J. H. Murison and they sold the land to one De Weber for \$125 an acre. When Pommeranke learned of all this he entered a suit to recover the full amount obtained for the land by Coy, Bate & Murison, with the result above stated, less a commission of about \$12 an acre.

A Royal Confession Album.

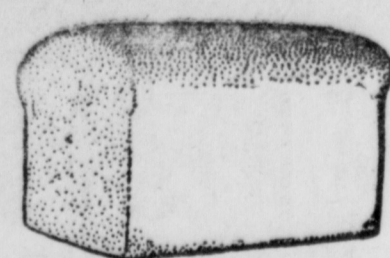
