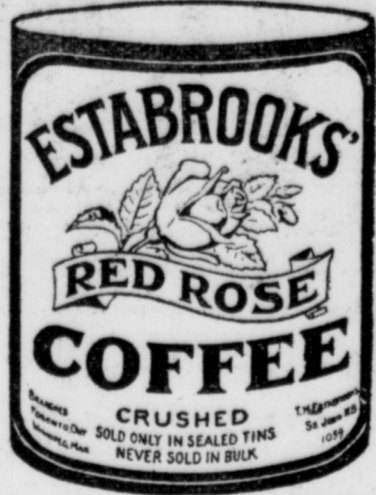


Crushed Coffee— what it is
