To the Editor of THE DISPATCH.

Dear Sir,—Many people are interested in the Preparatory Course of Music which I am teaching here, and through the columns of your paper a few remarks might be made regarding it.

This course of music is taught in two grades—the Primary or Kindergarten and the Intermediate.

In the Primary grade, motion songs, with illustrations and explanations of each song are studied and marches developing into simple drills. Children from four to eight years of age, according to mental development fill this grade.

The Intermediate grade is a step beyond the Primary. The motion songs and drills are a part of the work, also the study of keys (plano); their arrangement, the bass and treble clefs—one octave of notes in each, and simple musical terms.

The idea of the system is to develop the musical sense of the child and prepare him for the study of an instrument without the tedium of hard practice; and to simplify generally the work of the beginner.
