If any one had suggested ten years ago that Southern planters might come to regard corn as a profitable rival of cotton he would have been ridiculed. Yet it has come to pass that the corn-crop of Louisiana, which was twenty-five million bushels in 1899, grew to fifty-one millions in 1909, and the crop for this year is estimated at between sixty and one hundred million bushels. The cotton crop, on the other hand, has decreased from seven hundred thousand bales in 1899 or two hundred and seventy thousand in 1909, and corn yields about three times as much an acre as cotton.—The Youth's Companion

The Census Bureau's mortality reports show that tuberculosis still leads all other diseases in the number of deaths it causes in the United States; but the margin over pneumonia is now exceedingly small. The area covered by the reports includes more than half the United States. In this area there was an increase in the number of deaths from pneumonia last year, over the year before, of more than nine in every hundred thousands. The total was over seventy thousand, and is within seven of the number of deaths from consumption.—The Youth's Companion

Highway of Peace.

It was the unanimous opinion of the delegates to the recent Interparliamentary Conference at Brussels that all great straits and inter-oceanic canals should be free to commerce, unhampered by any act of war. One of the German delegates submitted the outline of a treaty intended to produce that desirable condition.

Special reference was made to the Straits of Magellan, but the plan would include such waterways as the Bosphorus, the straits of Gibraltar and Dover, and the North seas, as well as the Suez and the Panama canals.

The United States has always insisted that the straits connecting oceans and bounding nations are international highways, open to all ships in time of peace. The Interparliamentary Conference seeks to keep them open in time of war, so that there may be no blockading or other interruption to peaceful business.

Fortification of such waterways is not inconsistent with their neutralization. The Suez Canal has been neutral since 1887, and no warlike act may be done within its waters or within three miles of either entrance. It is the general understanding that the Panama Canal will also be open to the commerce of the world, and that such fortification as may be erected will be for the protection of the highway from the depredations of isthmian revolutionists as much as for its preservation against other hostile attacks.

The demand for neutral highways for commerce is an interesting illustration of the growth of the commercial spirit. Men used to go to war for trade. They now demand peace for the same reason.—The Youth's Companion.

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Calia Ward Howe died at Middleton

Middleton, R. I. Oct. 17.—Mrs. Julia Ward Howe died at her summer home today. Mrs Howe was taken ill with a chill a few days ago.

[The famous writer and philanthropist was born in New York on May 17, 1819, and was the daughter of Samuel and Julia Rush ward. She was privately educated, and in 1843 married Dr. Samuel Gridley Howe who died in 1876. With him she conducted The Boston Commonwealth an anti-saltri paper, prior to the civil war. After the slavery question was settled she became active in woman's suffrage, prison reform and the cause of peace. She was a Unitarian preacher, lecturer and writer. Her Battle Hymn of the Republic is widely known, and she was the author of many other works. Mrs Howe visited St John a few years ago, attending a meeting of the Association for the Advancement of women. At that time she preached in the Unitarian church and was compelled to address an overflow meeting in the Institut, so great was the demand to hear her. Maud Howe Elliott and Laura E Richards are daughters of Mrs Howe.
