Mrs Mary M Briggs whose maiden name was Cunningham, was born in Jacksonville, N B November 5 th 1840. She received her early education at the St Johns Academy St John N B was also a graduate of the New Brunswick Normal School. And finished her education at Coburn Classical Institute Waterville, Maine. She taught for several years with marked success holding positions in the Ladies Seminary at St Stephens N B. in New York and portions of the west While teaching in the state of New York she was more or less activity engaged in Home Mission work in which she was interested She was united in marriage with the Rev W F Penny of Newfoundland, who lived but a short time. She was afterwards married to Samuel E Briggs in the year 1885 at Bloomfield N B and they came to Caribou in 1890. On Monday Oct 10 th after a lingering illness of several months. She was called from us and left her family consisting of her husband three sons Murray Judson and Ezra who reside in Caribou; three daughters Mrs M J Cowgill of Denver Colorado Mrs E D Miller of Bellington Wash and Mrs Lydia Burpee of the same place and two nieces the Misses Vesta and Fay Shepherd who have lived in the family for a number of years besides many other relatives and friend to mourn their loss. Mrs Briggs was a woman of rare qualities of heart and mind. From her early girlhood she was actively engaged in Church and Temperance work. Everything of a nature calculated to uplift and inspire humanity received from her sympathy and co operation.

From the first of her coming to our home town, the church, W C T U, the Social and Literary clubs found in her an active and efficient helper. She was especially interested in the work of the local W C T U and her spirit of devotion must rest let us hope in large measure, upon those who are left to carry on the work she could carry no longer. She was a woman deeply devoted to the interests of her home and family, ever ready to hold out a helping hand to those who needed her service. As a neighbor and friend, especially, those who were unfortunate, she gave herself with unstinted generosity, and many a lonely heart has been cheered by her loving ministrations. Truly we all unite with those nearest to mourn our loss, but life is sweeter and the community better for her having been with us for "No life can be pure in its purpose and strong in its strife and all life not be purer and stronger thereby." A large responsibility rests upon all who have felt the force and influence of her example to carry out the ideals of life and character to which her own life was dedicated, and may none of us fall in the trust committed to our care.—The Aroostook Republican.
