The Impending War with Canada
(The Independent, New York.)
As our readers know, plans are already on foot in England and the United States to celebrate in 1914 the centenary of peace between the two nations. The one shining example before the world of the way to limit armaments by international agreement is the Rush Bagot Treaty of 1817, under which the United States and Canada have lived for all these years in mutual peace and security. In the September 'Nineteenth Century,' however, Capt Cecil Battine, in an article entitled 'Canada Growing up,' apparently thinks the time had come to revise this mollycoddle policy. Says he:—

'The British Navy will guarantee that the coasts of Canada are secure, but it is a sound instinct on her part to prepare thus early to be self supporting even in the matter of naval construction. Should Canada be threatened with war on her southern frontier, the military command of the great lakes would be of the most vital importance. An arsenal and dock yard must therefore be prepared to construct suitable craft for a struggle on the inland waters, as remote as possible from a possible raid, and having access to the lakes by the waterway of the St Lawrence. It is a striking example of the permanent principles of strategy that the valley of the St Lawrence is the key to military supremacy in Canada now, as it was when Wolfe so gallantly won Quebec for England, and the valley of the Hudson still leads the way to the vitals of the United States, if a northern invader should be bold enough to take the initiative.'

We think the Captain's ideas are sound, but he does not go far enough. Let the Rush Bagot Treaty be denounced. Then Canada and the United States could make one continuous fortification along the shores of the St Lawrence, and establish opposing army posts every five miles from Vancouver to Winnipeg. noughts could also be built by each nation on the Great Lakes, so that no overt acts could take place there. Toronto and Chicago would, of course, have to be guarded by three lines of submarine mines, Montreal and Buffalo would need at least \$20,000,000 for modern coast defenses, while it would be absolutely necessary for Quebec to doubt the height of the cliffs on which she is situated so as to prevent their being scaled a second time. Seattle and Vancouver might each keep balloons anchored a few miles up in the air to watch the war preparation of the other. In the meantime the Atlantic and Pacific squadrons of the British and American navies should have their decks cleared for action, and 10,000 aeroplanes in either country to put in commission to repel these mutual attacks in hot air. As probably all this would not be enough to preserve the peace, we might reasonably demand compulsory rifle practice in the public schools of England and United States, and universal military service from all male citizens between twenty one and forty five, and all enrolled suffragets of whatever age. Thus and thus only, according to our Captain Battine, can be guaranteed that certain and perpetual peace, that blessed millennial peace, that peace that passeth all understanding.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—Reports from all parts of the United States show a marked decline in the price of meats and other foodstuffs. Not only have there been reductions from the Atlantic to the Pacific, but prominent packers say that prices will go yet lower. J Ogden Armour, head of Armour & C., declared yesterday in Chicago that the prevailing tendency was now to ward a lower level. By gradual stages the bottom will be reached in a few months, Mr Armour predicts. Edward A Cudahy, head of the Cudahy Pack and Company, in Omaha, says prices must go still lower. He attributes the decreases already made and those still to come to the enormous corn crop and the sharp drop in prices of corn.

The latest Leviathans of the Atlantic are over a sixth of a mile long. Montreal Harbor Trust should get the Government to put a few more dredges into commission on the St. Lawrence channel or Quebec will soon be the only possible port for the liner of the first class.—Toronto Globe.

Thirty thousand miners are on strike in the South Wales collieries, and many of them are in riotous mood. Police and military have been called to restore order. The miners struck against the employment of non union labor.—World Wide.

'What Ireland Wants'
(Mr Redmond, in McClure's Magazine.)
Here, then, is 'what Ireland wants': 'Legislative and executive control of all purely Irish affairs, subject to the supreme authority of the Imperial Parliament.'
In other words, we want an Irish Parliament, with an Executive responsible to it, created by act of the Imperial Parliament, and charged with the management of purely Irish affairs (land, education, local government, transit, labor, industries, taxation for local purposes, law and justice, police, etc.) leaving to the Imperial Parliament, in which Ireland would probably continue to be represented, but in smaller numbers, the management, just as at present, of all Imperial affairs—Army, Navy, Foreign Relations, Customs, Imperial Taxation, matters pertaining to the Crown, the Colonies, and all those other questions which are Imperial and not local in their nature, the Imperial Parliament also retaining an overriding supreme authority over the new Irish legislature, such as it possesses today over the various legislatures in Canada, Australia, South Africa, and other portions of the Empire.

This is 'what Ireland wants.' When she has obtained it, a new era of prosperity and contentment will arise. As happened when Lord Durham's policy was carried out in Canada, men of different races and creeds will join hands to promote the well-being of their common country. Responsibility thrown for the first time for over a century upon the people, will have the same effect in Ireland as elsewhere. Trust in the people will effect as startling and dramatic a transformation of feeling and sentiment in Ireland as in South Africa. Those of us who have been struggling in this cause of thirty years are thankful to feel that at last the fighting is practically over, and that all that remains remains is to settle the exact terms on which the Treaty of Peace is to be drawn up.

Reciprocity conferences between representatives of the United States and of Canada, were opened in Ottawa on Saturday. Proceedings were conducted behind closed doors. While no announcement has been made it is understood that there was disclosed on both sides an appreciation of the difficulties each country might have with some of its own people in making any substantial tariff change. Ottawa has received strong protests against the reciprocity plan on the ground that Canada is prospering now and it would be better to let well enough alone. However, a genuine effort will be made to accomplish reciprocity along lines which will be beneficial to both countries and which will not bear oppressively upon any considerable industry in either country. There is good feeling on both sides and a belief that something definite will be accomplished.—World Wide.

Mr John Remond, M P., Mr F P O'Connor, M P., and the rest of the delegation which visited the United States to collect funds for the cause of home rule in Ireland sailed from New York on Saturday. Mr Redmond departed in no very good humor though he said he was taking back pledge for \$150,000 and expected \$50,000 in addition as a result of the trip. Mr Redmond was asked how near Ireland was to home rule, but he turned his back upon his questioners. He refused to discuss any other phase of politics.—World Wide.
